SANTIAGO, July 18: World Cup runners-up Argentina defeated Brazil 3-2 in a grueling South American soccer championship final-round match on Wednesday to confirm their status as favourites, reports Reuter.

Despite the expulsion of their star forward Claudio Canniggia, Argentina held on to their lead in a bruising encounter that saw four players sent off.

Argentina lead the roundrobin finals of the 10-nation Copa America, with Chile and Colombia in second place after playing to a 1-1 draw.

Argentina opened the score in the first minute of play with a header by Dario Franco from a corner.


