The scientists detected the apparent planet by analyzing radio waves from a very dense object called a neutron star.

A police spokesman denied the charge.

Haider, a member of the upper house of parliament, said the alleged torture was "the worst case of human rights violations in Pakistan."

He said police had also tortured party activist Rajab Ali Brohi after the murder last month of a judge trying Bhutto's Jailed husband Asif Ali Zardari.

the move. "It will destroy the judicial system of Pakistan, it's a conspiracy," she said.

Her Pakistan People's Party (PPP) has said it would hold a strong of anti-government rallies starting by the end of this month.

Referring to the dismissal of Kashmiri Premier Mumtaz Hussain Rathore early July, Ms. Bhutto said the federal government was showing the same "high-handedness" which marked "Indian actions" in the territory controlled by New Delhi.

Mrs Bhotto called for reelection in Azad Kashmir, the name for Pakistani part of Kashmir, to restore the confidence of the people.

### Tourists can curb slaughter of turtles

JAKARTA: Indonesia; attacked for allowing the mass slaughter of turtles in its tropical waters, said it was committed to their protection, reports Reuter.

The environmental group Greenpeace says Indonesia slaughter of endangered sea turtles would be greatly reduced if Western tourists stopped buying souvenir shells and jewellery.

"If tourists stopped buying tomorrow it could have a huge impact," the groups Sea Turtle Campaigner, Trevor Daly, said in Sydney earlier yesterday at the launch of a worldwide campaigning to stop the killings. Two million tourists.

mostly from Australia, Japan, North America, Britain and Germany visit Indonesia every year and spend millions of dollars on turtle products. Daly said.

Turtles, six species of which live around Indonesia, are killed in the resort island of Bali for religious ceremonies and for souvenirs made from the shells.

"We will farm protected and unprotected turtles. The protected turtles will be left in the sea and unprotected ones will be developed for consumption by the Balinese and for handicrafts," Indonesian Environment Minister Emil Salim said. Greenpeace estimated 50,000 green and hawksbill turtles

- protected under international trade agreements - were slaughtered every year in Indonesia for their meat, shells and eggs, about half on Bali.

Stuffed turtles, their shells polished to a high gloss, are openly sold in the Indonesian capital, Jakarta, and other parts of the country. Despite a decree in Bali last year to protect turtles, the

number slaughtered has not declined, Greenpeace said. Indonesia joined the International convention banning trade in the products of endangered species in 1979.

"But demand for hawksbill shells in consumer countries, particularly Japan, has ensured that significant quantities continued to be exported to foreign markets in breach of the convention," Daly said.

Japan, the biggest importer of turtle products, last month agreed to stop the import of the endangered hawksbill turtle from 1993.

Australian customs officials confiscated more than 1,000 turtle shells and items of jewellery in 1990, many taken from tourist who did not know they were breaking the law, a customs spokesman said.

"We will do our best for the turtle," Salim said. "We will hold a meeting on July 23 between government departments to work out a programme on how to conserve turtles.

## Burma's junta blatantly ignores people's voice, says Baker

KUALA LUMPUR, July 25: US Secretary of State James Baker told southeast Asian allies today he was pleased with the region's growing political openness, but dismayed by Burma's lack of democracy, reports Reuter.

"We applaud trends towards political openness in Southeast Asia," Baker told Foreign Ministers of the Association of South East Asian Nations

"We view with dismay the situation in Burma, where a self-appointed military leadership regularly violates basic human rights and has blatantly ignored the people's voice as clearly expressed in popular elections.

Western nations have been pressing ASEAN - Bruent, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore and Thailand- to exert pressure on neighbouring Burma, where the military government has refused to surrender power to opposition politicians democratically elected a year ago.

Burma has closed itself from "the society of nations by its political brutality and economic disintegration," said Baker, attending an annual

meeting of ASEAN Foreign Ministers and their main trading partners.

ASEAN officials have rejected calls to exert pressure on Burma, saying they preferred to persuade the gov-

LONDON, July 25: A British court jailed three Sikh militants on Wednesday for between 10 and 15 years each for plotting to kill moderate Sikh leaders in Britain, reports

Businesswoman Gursharn Sarkaria, identified as the driving force of the group, was sentenced to 15 years at London's old Bailey court for conspiracy to murder. Co-conspirators Sutpal Binjie. Andparmjit Sidhu were jailed for 10 and 11 years.


