Brisk Walking Needs No Age

Fear of heart attacks, blood pressures and diabetes are common mental pressures. Not only centres around the food habits, but physical exercises are of significant importance too. But rarely do we hear anyone say, "Let's go for a walk." It is more, "What about going to a Chinese restaurant for dinner tonight?" Exercise, taken under a doctor's guidance by patients with serious hypertension, angina or heart disease, has been shown to reduce blood pressure and combat tension. Brisk walking is suitable for more than 90 per cent of these people. While talking about walking or more precisely morning-walk, we usually tend to relate it to the older generation — those who are retired or are on their way.

The human race was designed, as I read in an international journal, not just to jog for its exercise and partly recreation, but to walk.

Most people look silly jogging, but one can walk with swank, one can walk with style, one can feel like General de Gaulle parading down the Champs-Elysées. One can observe with dignity the passing scene, one can converse without panting and smile without strain.

Here, around the Parliament House and Crescent Lake, in Sher-e-Bangla Nagar, and even around the Dhannondi

Lake, we mostly notice elderly men going for their morning walks, while very few women are to be noticed. Men in their late 30s or early 40s are a rare sight. Whereas, as one of my senior colleagues pointed out, Suhrawardy Udayan every dawn warmly welcomes a pool of people of all ages.

The older men who are regular morning walkers, might be old acquaintances or have met during their walks. Their conversations, if anyone gets to eavesdrop without being rude or nosy, are indeed interesting. Obviously it is a wide range of subjects from national and international politics, drawbacks of civil service, the problems of collecting the pension every month and much more! Some say, "My wife and I feel very lonely. Because we have two sons who have settled in the States, and we get to see them only once in two years. It is just two of us in that huge house." Another one says quite joyfully, "Oh, thank God that I have a daughter and a son. My daughter is in Dhaka and her



man reaches forty he sees before him a shadow-line, crosses it with a shiver and believes that the enchanted realms of youth are closed to him thereafter. To-day we put this shadow line at about fifty, but it exists nevertheless, and those who cross it, though they be active and alert, experience the slight shiver and the brief moment of despair that Conrad spoke of.

For those who regularly go for morning walks everything is fresh and dewy. The early sun seems to be catching up with their pace as the traffic hurries to work or school or somewhere out of town. The stylised grace of their exertions haunts with the power of their age and experience. They come regularly for happy reconciliation of mind and soul, rest and labour, the walk before breakfast. In a way the younger generation should be influenced to a greater extent to get the feel of this freshness. This, in the long run, would not only be refreshing but would certainly have an impact on health and mind, too.

Other speakers include one lady member of Parliament from Indonesia, Mrs. Otje Djundjunan, Additional Secretary of the Bangladesh Ministry of Agriculture Mr Md Irshadul Haq, Director-General of Family Planning Mr. Najmul Huq, Senior Adviser to the Bangladesh Ministry of Land, Mr. Hans Rolland and Mr. SM Ali, celebrated journalist and Editor, The Daily Star.

There will be a colourful Indonesian Night at 7.30 pm at Sonargaon Hotel on the same day. The Indonesian Night comprises Cultural performances by Indonesian Artiste of international repute from Jakarta and Food Festival. World famous Indonesian singers Ifje Trisnawati and Dian Pisesa will take part in musical performances.

A week-long exhibition of Indonesian products will begin at Sonargaon Hotel at 10 am on August 16, 1991, to be inaugurated by Minister of Commerce Mr. MK Anwar.

Society for professionals

Peshabji Parisad (Society for Professionals on Sunday) expressed its solidarity with the passage of 12th Amendment Bill hoping that it will bring political stability and economic development in the country.

National Awami Party

Bangladesh Betar Television Shilpi Sangsad Radio-TV Artistes' Association has called upon the government to ensure the autonomy and neutrality of radio and television.

In a press release on Sunday the sangsads congratulated Prime Minister Khaleda Zia and Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina for switching over to parliamentary form of government.

It hoped that a major pledge of the mass movement, the autonomy and neutrality of radio and television would be fulfilled soon.

Joint Secretary General of Bangladesh Union Parisad Members Association A K M Shahabuddin in a statement on Sunday urged the government to disburse loans among the cyclone victims on easy terms.

He also alleged anomalies in distributing loans in the areas and demanded construction of damaged embankment in the coastal areas.

Lawyers' Concern

Lawyers' Concern, an organisation of young lawyers, on Sunday extended its support to the move to abolish upazila courts and passage of Indemnity (Repeal) Bill.

In a statement signed by its convenor A F M Rezaur Rahman and Joint Convenors Sakhawatuddin Ahmed and Mahbubul Haider said that the move is timely and urged the lawyers organisations to reach a consensus on the issue.

Former French PM helps raise Tk 20 lakh for cyclone victims

Bangladeshi artists raised

nearly Taka 20 lakh for recent cyclone and flood victims of the country by staging cultural shows in the French cities, reports reaching in Dhaka Sunday said.

The shows held in Bordeaux, Nantes and Paris on June 7, 11 and 13 respectively were organised by different French voluntary organisations including Secours Catholique, Lions Club, Docks de France and Salon Symbiose.

Former French Prime Minister and present Mayor of Bordeaux city Jacques Chaban Delmas played a key

role in arranging the shows to raise the funds amounting to nearly 7 lakh franc.

Internationally renowned mime artist Partha Pratim Majumder was the main attraction of the shows. Eminent painter Karmaker painted a piece on the canvas before the audience during Partha's show at Bordeaux.

The painting will be put on auction and the sale proceeding will also be added to the fund for the cyclone


