SAVAR, Aug 17: Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia today said the people of Bangladesh would never allow any conspiracy to foil national progress and development,

Addressing a huge public meeting at Savar College ground here this afternoon, Begum Zia said, "The people of this country do not believe in

conspiracy". She said the autocratic government of Ershad had come to power through conspiracy but the people ousted him.

The Prime Minister said a section of people had been hatching conspiracy to foil democracy. So their tall talks about democracy become mere lip service, she added.

A balanced budget of Taka 174,61,64,300 for fiscal 1991-92 and a revised budget of Taka 126,65,25,000 for fiscal 1990-91 of the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) were an-

nounced Saturday. The DCC Mayor Mirza Abbas while announcing the budgets at a press conference at the 'Gulshan Mayor Bhaban' in the city said that the budget of the current fiscal has been designed in consistence with reality and the earnings of the
