Chandra suffers broken leg

BANGALORE, Aug 18: Chandrasekhar, one of the alltime great leg-spinners, may have bowled his last googly, doctors said today, reports Reuter.

They said the 45-year-old former Test star, injured in a traffic accident in the South Indian city of Bangalore or Tuesday, suffered multiple fractures to his left leg and was unlikely to bowl again.

Bhagwat Subrahmanya Chandrasekhar, more commonly known as Chandra, had been playing club cricket since his retirement from Test matches more than a decade

He had played both at home and abroad and had recently signed a contract with a club in Victoria, Australia.

He took 242 wickets in 58 Tests with googlies, top-spinners and leg-breaks bowled close to medium pace. Chandrasekhar also had the dubious distinction of taking more wickets in Tests than he scored runs.
