

Capriati's chances bloom



24 : The time and circumstances, if not the stars and biorhythms, are perfect for

Jennifer Capriati to make the leap from teen-age curiosity to youngest US Open champion in history, reports AP. At 15, Capriati comes back

to the Open this week stronger, faster and far more confident than a year ago after winning two tournaments this summer, beating Monica Seles twice, and knocking off Martina Navratilova at Wimbledon.

Capriati may be only the seventh seed, but she's peaking while virtually everyone above her is having problems. No 1 Steffi Graf skipped a

tuneup tournament in Washington because of a shoulder injury. Seles, No 2, has been bothered by shin splints and off-court hassles since she passed up Wimbledon. No 3 Gabriela Sabatini, the defending champion, has languished lately, losing to Japan's Kimiko Date in an early round of a recent tournament. No 4 Arantxa Sanchez

Vicario and No 5 Mary Joe Fernandez played well at Washington but neither seem to have the combination of speed, strength, stamina and determination needed to win a US Open on the hard courts of the National Tennis Center.

Navratilova, No 6, took a physical and psychological pounding with her loss to Capriati at Wimbledon and remains an outsider to capture a fifth Open title. Navratilova, 34, lost in the quarters her last year and hasn't won the title since 1987.


Pam Shriver once had the potential and the opportunity that Capriati has now, but couldn't quite grab it. She came close, beating Navratilova in the semifinals before losing to Chris Evert in the final.

Shriver remembers exactly how old she was - "16 years, 2 months, 7 days" - and believes Capriati has a chance to break her record as the youngest fi-

"She has a pretty good shot, better than anyone for the next four of five years," Shriver said adding that Capriati could go a step farther than she did by winning the to titles proved it

by beating Seles and Martina. But semis and finals back-toback? It might be a year early for that, but nothing she does at this point is too much of a surprise.

"I would think the odds on a 15-year-old aren't good, but if ever there was one that

could win, it's Jennifer."

"Beating Martina was a huge breakthrough for Jennifer, and beating Martina at Wimbledon made it even bigger," Austin said. "She's rounding out her game, serving better, moving better. She's faster now than last year. She's adding to her game all the time. She always hit hard, but now her shots have a purpose."

Austin noted that while Capriati has been improving. her rivals have become com placent in their games.

"Sometimes they become

"I swear, she did it right before our eyes at the US Open," said Austin, who is now a television commentator.

Sabatini, whose only loss in seven matches with Capriati came three weeks ago when a blister forced her to quit in the second set of the Canadian Open, could be her biggest challenge with a likely meeting in the quarterfinals.

"It'll be interesting to see how Sabatini handles the pressure of defending," said Shriver. "She hasn't played great this summer, may be because that's on her mind a little. She may have peaked during the clay court tournaments before Paris in the spring."

The men's draw is at least as wide open as the women's. No 1 Borts Becker has hardly dominated since his collapse in the final at Wimbledon. Stefan Edberg, No 2, stumbled in the first round here last year and got to only the fourth


