A conspiracy to undo democracy: DUCSU leaders

Leaders of Dhaka University Central Students Union (DUCSU) Saturday expressed concern at the situation created by the government employees over the new pay scale and called upon them to join work for greater national interest.

In a statement they said the new democratic government offered the enhanced pay package despite a tight budgetary situation while one and a half crore people were unemployed and caution efforts were on to restore the

ruined economy. It was a 'political conspiracy' by some vested quarters to ntp the fledgling democracy by 'holding hostage' the government employees and creating an 'anarchic' situation. The 12 crore people were in turn held hostage by this, DUCSU Vice-President Amanullah Aman and General Secretary Khairul Kabir Khokon said.

UNB Adds: In a similar statement, Jatiyatabadi Samajik Sangskritic Sangstha (JASAS) President Khurshid Ali and General Secretary Zahid Hossain Chunnu expressed grave concern over the "stalemate in the administration created by a section of the employees".

They termed the action by some government employees "a heinous plot" to hamper the democratic atmosphere and called upon all employees to return to their duties for greater interest of the nation and the country.

The PFP, which was formulated in last May, is scheduled to be presented to the IMF board in Washington on Aug 30 for approval.

The possible postponement of PFP approval has made uncertain the release of US dollar 200 million in 1991-92 from the IMF under its on-going Enhanced Structural Adjustment Facility (ESAF) programme, apprehends Finanee Secretary Khorshed Alam.

Three killed as School teachers' truck rams coaster ultimatum for at Dharmapur

By Staff Correspondent Three persons were killed and another six injured when a truck collided head-on with a coaster at Dharmapur on the Dhaka-Chittagong Highway under Chouddagram upazila in Comilla early Saturday morning, according to information

received in Dhaka. Comilla district administration officials, when contacted over telephone, said that the accident when the Chittagongbound truck rammed into the Dhaka bound coaster coming from Sonagazi.

Two persons died on the spot while another person succumbed to the injuries on way to the Comilla General Hospital.

The victims of the accident were identified as Abdul Mannan (30) and Zahurul Huq (22) while the third victim could not be identified. Six persons were taken to the Comilla Hospital, where four were released after first aid.

From Page 1 Col. 7 apart from floods and drought, cyclone, hailstorm, tidal bore and salinity hampered agriculture production on 30 lakh hectares of land. She said the loss in the agricultural production was increasing with the increase of attack by pests and diseases. She said the 28 lakh hectares of land in the southern region of the country experienced pest attack for almost round the year.

The Prime Minister said the most devastating cyclone of the recent memory on April 29 destroyed crops on 18 lakh hectares of land.

She said, with the present rate of growth the population of the country would stand at 15 erore by the year 2000. The economy of Bangladesh is mainly based on agriculture and the present size of total cultivable land is 81.60 lakh hectares, she said adding it was imperative to produce additional foodgrains to provide food to this vast population. She underscored the need for beefing up the improved agricultural programme for increasing production in the sector.

She reminded the agricultural scientists of their responsibilities to innovate newer technology for risk management in agricultural production. She expressed her satisfaction that BARC at present got a computerised data base through which it could collect information regarding country's agricultural climate and land, soil, water resource and general climate on the basis of environment and re-

scientists would be able use this information in risk man agement. She suggested that the scientists could use crop model of risk management of developed nations.

three were admitted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital. They were, Khan Majlis (28), Feroz Ahmed (50) and Tazimul Islam (29), all employees of different min-

Police sources said that seven policemen were injured during the agitation. Among them one constable was admitted to the Police Hospital while the other's received first

Police action began at around 9 am when employees were agitating in support of their demand for a pay rise and the refixation of office tim-According to their fresh

programme of movement, em-

ployees in the Secretariat signed the attendance regis ter in the morning and gathered in the premises between building Number 6 and 7. Police tried to disperse the demonstrators and at one

stage some employees were picked up by a police truck. The angry demonstrators

surrounded the truck and

demanded release of their colleagues.

Police resorted lathicharge on the agitators and tried to move the truck. but failed. At about 9.50 police lobbed about ten teargas shells. Witnesses said that three rubber bullets were also fired.

Employees alleged that

shots were fired at them, but police denied the allegation. After the teargas charge, the police truck moved out of the secretariat with the held

demonstrators in it. The employees of the sec retariat brought out a procession and gathered in front of the National Press Club where

Syed Mohiuddin, Secretary General of the Sanghati Parishad, eulogised deposed President Ershad in the press conference for his contribution to the government employees and said that they got benefits like time-scale, two bonuses during Eid festivals and higher wages during Ershad's rule.

The leaders of the employees unions said that the Pay Commission was constituted during Ershad's rule in 1990 and the pay scale was calculated on the basis of the prices of commodities on August 3. 1990.

Syed Mohiuddin said that he had presented a bouquet of flowers to Ershad and garlanded him because he fulfilled some basic demands of the employees. He said that he was ready to garland anyone who would fulfil their demands.

He blamed Minister MK Anwar and State Minister Tarigul Islam for their attempt to split the government employees. He said leaders of the employees union including Syed Atwar Rahman, Sheikh Syedur Rahman, Kazi Abdul Hannan and Bahauddin were bribed by the government to divide the government em-

ployees. Muttalib, President of the Sanghati Parishad, present in the press conference, alleged that Atwar Rahman had offered
