10 per cent cut in incidental expenditures ordered for implementation of new pay scale

Fresh recruitments if govt employees do not join work in three days

The Government on Sunday warned that it would be compelled to make fresh recruitments in place of those employees who would fail to return to their duties within the next three days, reports BSS.

A Press Note issued by the Ministry of Establishment said the Government was again advising the employees concerned, who were abstaining from work and obstructing others to joining work, not to compel it to take such action against its wish.

Meanwhile, Government announced its decision to reduce the incidental expenditures of the revenue budget for the fiscal 1991-92 by 10 percent in view of the announcement of the new national pay scale.

According to an official handout issued on the same day, the funds thus generated will have to be deposited immediately.

The Press Note said a handful of employees were instigating the employees, willing to work, to abstain from their duties in spite of the fact that they had been urged, through Press Notes and negotiations with their representatives for the last few days, to maintain proper atmosphere of the offices by devoting themselves to their normal work. The Press Note said, if necessary, help of the concerned employment exchange might be sought.

Such activities of these employees were undesirable in running the administration smoothly and they are liable to be dismissed under Clause 3 of the Public Employees (Special Provision) Ordinance 1979, the Press Note said.

Regarding the incidental expenditure cut, the government said its decision would be effective immediately and remain in force till June 30, 1992 and would be applicable to all government and semigovernment and autonomous organisations.

There will be a remarkable change in the expenditure sector of the budget in the period following the preparation and approval of the national budget in view of the announcement of the new pay scales. This has necessitated the need for limiting the controllable expenditure of the approved revenue budget of 1991-92 and taking steps to reduce expenditures at all levels of the public sectors, including the government administrative management and the autonomous organisa-

Water transport strike continues

Sufferings of the passengers mounted and normal business suffered on private motorised cargo and passenger carriers remained docked for the second day Sunday.

Owners of the vessels called an indefinite strike since midnight Friday demanding reduction of fuel prices to the pre-Gulf war level.

No such vessels plied in the 35 inland water routes in the country. The striking owners did not allow plying of the ships and other vessels belong to the Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation (BIWTC) by putting barricades on rivers at different parts of the country as a result, the BIWTC owned vessels had to be anchored at various places.

Passengers went to Sadarghat terminal, Sunday also but were found returning after a long wait. Most of the terminals wore a deserted look. At places, sailing of a few mechanised boats were attempted but were stopped by the striking owners and their employees.

Suspension of operation of about 5,000 private passenger carriers, cargoes, trawlers, barges, and tugs also seriously affected the city food markets. Prices of perishable goods including rice and vegetables shot up.

According to our Narayangani correspondent the BIWTC steamer Rocket plying between Dhaka and Khulna failed to reach Dhaka

due to barricades on the river Buriganga. The steamer was later routed to Narayangani and anchored at the BIWTC terminal there at 2.30 pm Sunday. The steamer started from Khulna Friday night for Dhaka. BIWIC sources said, it will sail for Khulna from Narayangani instead of Dhaka.

Barricades were also put at various points on the river Shitalakhya a number of engine boats were floated on the Shitalakhya but the strikers stopped those.

Prices of essentials, rose at the Narayangani markets due to the strike. BIWTC sources said, it had instructed the river traffic police to remain alert against any untoward in-See Page 12 Col. 6
