

Still, Sabatini has yet to show the all-court brilliance that carried her to victory last year at the National Tennis Centre for her first Grand Slam triumph.

In the first round, the 21year-old Sabatini was down 4-1 in the first set against Australian Nicole Provis ranked 50th, before battling back to force a tiebreak.


