Japanese government itself also finances technical training courses for overseas people, and Bangladesh benefits from that too".

One of the black spots in Bangladesh-Japan economic relations was the explosion at the Chorassal ammonia plant which left nine dead and scores injured. A Bangladesh government inquiry commission report said the explosion occured due to negligence, and painted a disturbing picture of circumvention of regulations by both the Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation and Kafco Investment Corp, the Japanese company engaged in constructing the ammonia plant. However, Ito does not think the incident will affect economic relations between

the two countries.

"No, I don't think there will be any adverse effect on bilateral business relations because of Ghorassal. It was an accident, due to technical reasons. Chemical industries, unfortunately, are rather risky", he said.

Japan's policy on development aid is based, judging by the manner of its disbursement, on according the recipient government maximum latitude on deciding its own priorities. Most of the money is given on a government-to-government basis, and very little is channeled through

That commitment, one assumes, will have to wait until the World Bank completes its feasibility study on the proposed bridge, and makes it recommendations. Until that happens, the modality of Japanese involvement in the project is unlikely to be worked out.


While economic and technical cooperation between Dhaka and Tokyo surge ahead, people-to-people contact between Bangladesh and Japan through cultural exchanges is still lagging behind.

"Cultural exchange is one area which we would like to develop", Ito said firmly, "We already have some cultural and academic exchange programmes, like scholarships for Bangladeshis to go and study at Japanese colleges and universities. There is also a youth exchange programme, through

But the question of Bangladeshis illegally working in Japan and getting deported remains a thorny one.

There is no way for ordinary people to go over to Japan and work, unless they are recruited by Japanese companies needing foreign technical people for jobs or on-the-job training. At present, there is some scope for Japanese companies recruiting limited number of overseas people for training and work", Ito said, adding ." think most Western countries including the United States, are very cautious about allowing foreigners to come and work in their countries. In Japan we have the problem of many illegal workers, and that is why we are trying to stem the flow".

Japanese technical and financial assistance.

"We have already completed half the work in setting up a digital telephone exchange for Dhaka, and the rest will be undertaken sometime in the near future", Ito pointed out.

But such positive actions do not apply, as yet, to the multi-million dollar Jamuna Multi Purpose Bridge Project, which is as important to Bangladesh politically as it is economically essential for the north-west districts of the country.

"We are one of the potential donors to the Jamuna Bridge Project, but there has not been any official decision yet", Ito said, "When prime minister Kaifu came here last year, he gave a positive response to the project, but there is no formal commitment as yet".

which young people from this country visit Japan for a few weeks, look at Japanese life, exchange views and establish contacts. We are in the process of starting another such programme this year, which was decided following prime minister Kaifu's visit".

Apart from government scholarships, Bangladeshi students can also apply directly to Japanese universities for admission. This year, 54 students have succeeded in obtaining Japanese university scholarships. Although these were private, individual efforts whose success depended on whether their academic records were competitive with other applicants, the staff at the embassy's cultural section played a vital role by providing information and advice.
