The committee formed at a cabinet meeting consists of State Minister for Energy Dr Mosharraf Hossain, State Minister for Labour and Manpower Barrister Rafigul Islam Mian, State Minister for Food Barrister Nazmul Huda and State Minister for Civil Aviation and Tourism Abdul

Meeting sources said the committee will review specially the legal aspect of the agreement, reached at the fag end of Ershad regime. The committee is expected to submit its report in a week.

The committee comes in the face of mounting pressure by the Japanese who demand of Bangladesh government to issue a Letter of Guarantee for 229-million dollar credit to the project to be given by Japanese banks.

Bangladesh is to have 30 per cent share in the 459 million dollar fertilizer factory and the rest 70 per cent by Japanese. Totally export-oriented, the factory is being set up in Chittagong.

The sources told UNB the government was no doubt serious about implementation of the project. But it wanted to renegotiate the terms of the Letter of Guarantee.
