

## Martina in quarters

NEW YORK, Sept 3: Using brains and brawn, Martina Navratilova beat Manuela Maleeva - Pragniere on Monday to reach the quarterfinals of the US Open tennis championships, reports Reuter.

"My body and my mind were working together, for a change," said the sixth-seeded Navratilova after edging the 10th-seeded Maleeva.

In the past, over-thinking has led Navratilova to nervous mistakes.

At Wimbledon she double faulted on match point to lose to Jennifer Capriati. In the 1987 French Open final loss to Steffi Graf, she also double faulted on match point.

Pressed by Maleeva-Pragniere's sharp passing shots and deep groundstrokes, this time Navratilova responded with cool winners.

At 3-3 in the tiebreaker, Navratilova made a great reaching backhand volley winner. She made two more volley winners and then after losing one set point, closed out the set by forcing a forehand error.

In serving out the match, Navratilova saved six break points before wrapping up the win with two winners.

There was nothing shaky in her game," Maleeva-Pragniere said. "I can't remember an approach shot she missed."

Though pleased, Navratilova is not yet satisfied.

"I don't go into a tournament hoping to get to the quarterfinals," she said. "I am waiting for the next one and anything can happen."

## PSV lead in Dutch league

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 3 PSV Eindhoven maintained their 100 per cent record with comfortable 3-1 win over lacklustre Sparta Rotterdam to go top of the Dutch First Division on Sunday, reports Reuter.

Last year's league champions, PSV opened the scoring in the 1st minute when Libertad Giga Popescu rifled in a 15-metre shot.

The team then seemed to lose their attacking edge until a halftime pep talk from trainer Bobby Robson restored the momentum.

"In the first half, the players were a bit slow and easy-going. In the break, we talked it over," said the former England manager.

Wim Kieft scored in the 56th minute and midfielder Erwin Koeman added the third five minutes later after Sparta's Michel Valke lost control of the ball.

Sparta striker Edwin Vurens scored a consolation goal shortly afterwards.

The result left PSV on six points from three matches, one ahead of Ajax Amsterdam who beat MVV Maastricht 3-0.

John Van Loen scored the first in the 37th minute and Denis Bergkamp added two more shortly after the interval. On Saturday, early season league leaders Roda JC Kerkrade suffered a crushing 5-1 defeat at home to FC Voldenam.

### SPANISH SCENE

Away in Spain, Atletico Madrid kicked off their season on Sunday with an uninspired 2-0 win in the Spanish First Division against a nine-man Burgos team deprived of their first-choice goalkeeper after scuffles broke out on the pitch.

After a goalless first half, the match erupted in the 46th minute when Burgos goalkeeper Augustin Eludayen was sent off for a professional foul on striker Manolo Sanchez.

The referee awarded a penalty but his decision sparked an immediate protest and Burgos's Enrique Ayucar was sent off after a scuffle for kicking out at the Atletico players.

### Under - 16 TT

## Holmes sues promoters

ALLEN TOWN, Sept 3: Former heavyweight champion Larry Holmes has sued the promoters of

his first comeback bout, saying they reneged on their agreement and have tried to interfere in his boxing career since, reports AP.

The lawsuit filed in Northampton County Common Pleas Court, names LBA Associates Inc and Bob Rey, both of Newport Beach, Calif., and Jason Schlessinger of Lakewood, Calif.

Holmes signed a 10-month agreement for four fights with the three named in the suit. The deal started with his April 7 fight against Tim "Doc" Anderson.

The lawsuit alleges the three breached the agreement by failing to pay Holmes 35 per cent of the gross revenues exceeding dhs 200,000 from broadcast and other sales in the Anderson fight. The suit says they also failed to provide an account of the funds.

The breach, Holmes says, nullified the contract, and he broke with the promoters after beating Anderson. But they continue to interfere with the boxer's contractual relationship with other promoters, according to the lawsuit, which asks the court to declare the contract null and void.

Holmes received dhs

150,000 for the Anderson fight and would have, under the contract, received a total of dhs 500,000 more for the other three fights.

Holmes won his third comeback bout Sunday, knocking out Michael Greer with a series of right hooks 1:18 into the fourth round in Honolulu. He previously won a 10-round decision over Eddie Gonzales on Aug. 13 in Tampa, Fla. A message left on an answering machine at LBA Associates was not returned Friday night, and no telephone listing for Rey and Schlessinger could be found.

## Powell lashes Lewis

TOKYO, Sept 3: Long jumper Mike Powell, whose record-shattering leap at the world championships here catapulted him into the history books, hit out at Carl Lewis on Saturday, reports AP.

Lewis, unbeaten in the long-jump for 10 years, said after Powell's new world record long-jump on Friday night that it was a one-off fluke.

"He will probably never jump like that again," remarked Lewis, upset that Powell had beaten him in the quest to finally break the 23-year-old record set by American Bob Beamon in the 1968 Mexico Olympics.

Beamon, who cleared 8.90, never came near to repeating his record, and Lewis's suggestion that Powell would vanish from the world RPT athletics scene as quickly as Beamon clearly angered the 27-year-old.

"I'm ready to jump any time he wants to," said the former Southern California University student.

And Powell dismissed Lewis's boast of being unbeaten in the long-jump for 10 years. "Jumping two or three times a year, padding your record and saying you're unbeaten. That's not a champion," he said.

"His unbeaten streak is over, and he's got nothing to say. I won last night and I am the world champion. I am the man to beat now," added Powell, who jumped an amazing 8.95.

He said he would continue to jump 15 to 20 times a year instead of cutting back and building up a winning streak.

Powell said that Lewis's attempt to write him off would only make him jump even further.

"Carl saying negative things about me just fuels my fire. I know I can jump nine meters. I have been a nine meter jumper for the past two years," he said.

Powell said he used to play a video of Beamon getting the record in Mexico over and over again at his home in Los Angeles to improve his jumping.


"It gave me motivation and inspiration. I told myself 'I can

do that. I can jump that far,'" explained Powell, who added that he was still hurt that Beamon refused to respect him as a great jumper.

Last year at a meeting in Los Angeles Beamon, who was in the crowd, got up and walked out as Powell was getting ready to start his run up.

"Don't talk out when I am about to jump. Don't do that to myself. I will never forget that," said Powell.

Even when Beamon was

told at his Florida home on Friday that his record had been broken he admitted he never thought it would be the world record.

"I knew it was inevitable that someone would break my record, but like everyone else I had assumed it would be Carl Lewis," said Beamon.

Lewis did in fact leap past Beamon's 8.90 mark on Friday but the jump was wind-assisted, and when Powell made 8.95 Lewis became a co-star in the greatest long-jump competition ever seen.

Powell dismissed suggestions that he would change now that he had snatched the world record.

"It might change my bank account but when you look at it what do I do for a living — I run and jump into dirt," he said.

"This is my job. I love it. Even if I didn't get paid I'd be out there jumping anyway," he added.

## Fenech to fight Nelson

MELBOURNE, Sept 3: Jeff Fenech said on Tuesday he had agreed to fight a return world title bout against super-featherweight champion Azumah Nelson in Melbourne in December, reports Reuter.

The World Boxing Council (WBC) had ordered a rematch of the Australian's controversial drawn fight with Nelson in Las Vegas in June which left the crown with the Ghanaian.

The result outraged the 15,000 crowd and prompted a rare protest to the WBC from the Australian National Boxing Federation.

"I've signed the contract. As far as I'm concerned the fight is on," Fenech, who has held world titles in three weight divisions, said. The date in December and the venue in Melbourne have not been fixed.

Local promoter Bill Mordey said total prizemoney for the December bill would be more than four million dollars (three million US), the richest ever in Australia.

Mordey said Nelson would be meeting American promoter Don King in New York
