Tyson pleads not guilty



Sept 12: Former heavyweight champ Mike Tyson pleaded innocent

on Wednesday to rape charges, admitting he gets confused around women but calling the allegations ridiculous, reports Reuter. "I am going to prove my in-

nocence," Tyson told reporters after he was released on 30,000 dollars bond.

Promoter Don King, who accompanied Tyson, quipped at one point that the rape case might add to the glamour of Tyson's November 8 title fight against Evander Holyfield. But King later told a news

conference he was wrong to have said that adding that rape is a terrible thing to happen to a woman.

He then criticised the 18year-old Rhode Island woman who brought the charges, mentioning her by name several times - even though her name has not been used by news organisations.

Tyson, King said, is just the last in a line of men ranging from Pee-wee Herman and

former Senator Gary Hart to have been victimised by prob-

Tyson was indicted on Monday on rape and other charges after being accused by and tried to feel her breasts the woman, a contestant he met during a Miss Black America beauty pageant in Indianapolis last July. Trial in the case was set for January

The woman said she was driven to Tyson's hotel in his limousine and assaulted.

"A situation has occurred that is totally ridiculous. I didn't hurt anyone or do anything to anyone," the 25-yearold fighter said.

"Every time I trust a woman or get involved with one in a certain way like this, something happens, so I'm con-

"I am looking forward to fighting and confident I am going to be the champion on November 8," Tyson said of his scheduled 12-round bout with Holyfield in Las Vegas.

"I have to fight. That's how I make my living", Tyson said. "I love and respect women... 4

A friend of the victim said Tyson had grabbed her hips. earlier on the night of the alleged rape.

Noemi McKenzie, another contestant, said in testimony obtained by the New York Daily News that Tyson pressed his body against hers and said,"Let's go out, don't you want me?"

She said she replied,"Not in a million years."

Tyson was charged with

one count of rape, which carries a prison sentence of six to 20 years; two counts of criminal deviate conduct, which carries the same penalty per count; and one count of confinement — unlawful restraint - which carries a sentence of one to three years.
