





The rains flooded the city and several areas in the metropolis went under kneedeep to waist-deep water.

Meteorological Department recorded the season's highest rainfall of 120 mm in the city in 12 hours ending at 6 pm Sunday. The earlier record was 97 mm on September 9.

Early morning drizzles turned into torrential rain at about 11.30 am and continued

without intermission till 2-30 pm in the city. Moderate rainfall also continued till evening.

Most of the city roads, lanes, by-lanes and low-lying areas went under water. Water up to one foot and above was seen till evening in roads and lanes in Bashaboo, Kamalapur, Khilgaon, Dhanmondi, Mohammadpur, Tejgaon, Gulshan Ramna, Motifheel and Sabujbagh areas causing sufferings to the people.

The downpour and waterlogging in the city affected voting in yesterday's referen-

Water entered into the shops after submerging the footpaths in Elephant road, Nilkhet, Dhanmondi, Kakrail, Malibagh, Santinagar, Nazimuddin road areas where shopkeepers were seen guarding their shops opening the Slum dwellers were seen

taking shelter at different city shopping centres and at dry footpaths as water entered their sheds. Vandors disappeared from the footpaths in See Page 12 Col. 2

Heavy rains coupled with onrush of water from upstream aggravated the flood situation

in 14 districts. The situation deteriorated in Madaripur, Shariatpur, Faridpur, Kishoreganj, Manikganj, Gazipur, Munshiganj, Narayanganj, Chandpur, Magura, Pabna, Naogaon, Jamalpur and Hogra.

Though most of the rivers started receding at a slow pace, there was no marked improvement in the overall flood situation in the country. Although waters were re-

ceding from the towns of Panchagarh, Dinajpur, Rangpur, Thakurgaon, Nilphamari, Kurigram and Kushtia, other areas of the districts remained under water.

The late monsoon deluge affected at least four million people rendering nearly a quarter of them marooned and

The Flood Information Centre of Water Development Board warned that the flood

situation in Dhaka, Narayanganj, Munshiganj and Manikganj will deteriorate further.

Situation in the districts of Rangpur, Gaibandha, Bogra, Sirajganj and Dinajpur is likely to improve further but will remain unchanged in Chapainawabganj, Rajshahi, Pabna, Kushtia, Faridpur, Madaripur and Chandpur.

Our Madaripur correspondent reports that 60 unions in four upazilas of the district including low-lying municipal areas were affected by flood that marooned about five lakh people. India deploys troops in Assam to fight ULFA

NEW DELIII, Sept 15: Indian Army troops were deployed today in the oil-rich northeastern state of Assam to fight separatist guerillas holding seven civilians hostage since July, report AFP.

An unspecified number of soldiers immediately launched coming operations against the outlawed United Liberation Front of Assam (ULFA), arresting several rebels, the Press Trust of Indian (PTI) reported.

The troops fanned out in the districts of Tinsukia, Dhemaji, Dibrugarh, Jorhat and Naogaon, which are known ULFA bastions, raiding the well-knit group's numerous

Twelve militants were arrested in the sudden swoop at Naogaon, some with arms and ammunition, and some others in Tinsukia and Jorhat, PTI

The news agency did not say if there was any resistance from the ULFA, a selfstyled Maoist group which does not recognise India's Constitution and says Assam was never a part of India.

Assam, a state of 22 million, is governed by India's ruling

Congress (I) Party.

ULFA, which was on the run after an army crackdown in November 1990 which was later called off, has refused to let off seven of 12 hostages seized July I despite the release of more than 400 jailed rebels by the Assam govern-

The fate of the seven, including four officials of the government's Oil and Natural Gas Commission (ONGC), was not immediately known. No further details of the army operation were available in New

Demands for army deployment in Assam mounted after the ULFA shot dead a hostage. ONGC engineer T S Raju, and Bipul Mahanta, an Assamese who was mediating the release of the abducted men. The killings sparked off a

erippling strike in ONGC, halting a daily production of half a million barrels of crude of and shaking India's economy, already reeling under its worst crists.

The powerful Jammu and Kashmir Liberation Front (JKLF) said its guerillas killed Subash Bose of the Federal Border Security Force (BSF) after he admitted playing a role in the arrest of 11 mili-

Bose, described as a senior Intelligence Officer, was seized by JKLF militants on the outskirts of Srinagar, the summer capital of Kashmir, India's only Muslim-majority state. No further details were available, and BSF officials in

New Delhi or in this urban hub of the separatist campaign could not be reached for comment.

The JKLF is one of the several Muslim groups waging an independence campaign in Kashmir.

Meanwhile, another rebel group freed the chief of an educational institution here today after keeping him in custody for 12 days.
