

Richie Richardson aims to follow the pattern that has made the team such a dominant force in world cricket during the last 12 years, reports Reuter.

RICHIE RICHARDSON sponding on Tuesday to last month's decision by the United Cricket Board of South Africa (UCBSA) to apply for inclusion in the Cup.

In a statement on South Africa and the World Cup made

International Cricket Council (ICC) meeting in London last July there was agreement that South Africa should not be included if a formal application was made.

"As no new factors have arisen which will affect this decision, the West Indies Cricket Board of Control is therefore not in a position to support the application of South Africa to participate in the World Cup," said the statement.

The WICBC said it had been approached by the UCBSA concerning future ties after the ICC decided to re-admit South Africa at its July meet-

West Indies abstained from voting on the re-admission of South Africa, saying the matter had not been discussed by its WICBC also announced here

that it would "respond positively" to an initiative by the UCBSA regarding the establishment of an exchange programme at administrative Australia and co-hosts New

Zealand last month welcomed South Africa's late bid to enter the World Cup, while Pakistan have already voted against allowing South Africa to play in the competition.

The limited overs tournament currently involves the seven Test-playing countries and Zimbabwe.

Tyson faces palimony suit LOS ANGELES, "Tyson even introduced



Oct 2: Former world heavy weight boxing champion Mike Tyson was sued

for 11 million dollars on Tuesday by a woman who claims he is the father of her 16-month-old son, reports Boxing promoter Don King

was named as a co-defendant in the so -called "palimony" suit brought in a Los Angeles court by attorney Marvin Mitchelson, who has gained a reputation as a palimony lawyer. Mitchelson told reporters

that Tyson promised to pay his client, 26-year-old Natalic Fears, 20,000 dollars a month in child support and to set up a five million dollar trust fund for the child, D'Amato Tyson. The late boxing trainer Cus D'Amato was an early mentor of Tyson's.

King was named in the suit, Mitchelson said, because Tyson backed down on his promise after King advised him it would damage his ca-Mitchelson said Fears and

Tyson had a two-year relationship. "Mike professed his love to Natalie. Natalie professed her love to Mike."

Natalic as Mrs Tyson and told his friends they were married," Mitchelson said.

He said Fears is an estate agent who divides her time between Los Angeles and Las

The lawsuit follows crimina rape charges in Indianapolis, Indiana, last month alleging Tyson forced an 18-year-old beauty pageant contestant to have sex with him in his hotel

Several other multi-million

dollar lawsuits have also been brought against him by women alleging he molested them by grabbing their buttocks.

Tyson will try to regain the world heavyweight championship in Las Vegas on November 8 when he fights the current champion, Evander Holyfield.

The fight is expected to generate a record 100 million dollars. Holyfield has been guaranteed 30 million dollars and Tyson 15 million.
