McEnroe bows to Krajicek

TOULOUSE, France, Oct 5: John McEnroe bowed out of the Toulouse Grand Prix tennis tournament Friday, losing his quarterfinal match to Richard Krajicek of the Netherlands, 6-4, 6-4, reports AP.

In other quarterfinals, topseeded Guy Forget beat Marc Rossct of Switzerland, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3; and Amos Mansdorf of Israel, who upset second seed Magnus Gustafsson in the first round, advanced with a 6-4, 6-4 victory over another Swede, Christian Bergstrom.

In the semifinals, Mansdorf faces Aleksandr Volkov of the Soviet Union, the No. 5 seed. Volkov beat Frenchman Cedric Pioline, 5-7, 7-6 (7-5), 6-2.

The top-seeded Forget, seeking his fifth tournament victory of the year, battled from behind to beat Rosset, the hard-serving Swiss. They may meet again next year in the second round of the Davis Cup if France and Switzerland win their opening matches.

Volkov and Pioline battled on even terms through the first two sets, which lasted nearly two hours. Then the Soviet raced to a 5-0 lead in the third before giving up two games. Then Volkov won on his serve, finishing the match with an ace.

Edberg in final at Ivanisevic's cost



SYDNEY, Oct 5: World number one Stefan Edberg denied exciting young power-server Goran

Ivanisevic the opportunity to cap an emotional week in a tense semifinal victory at the Australian Indoor tennis championship here Saturday, night, reports AFP.

Edberg's famed big match temperament won the night as Ivanisevic, imbued by vociferous Croat support, threatened to steamroll yet another tennis luminary after Friday night's classic win over Andre Agassi. The unflappable Swede

fought back from a set down to get up in two tiebreak sets, 4-6, 7-6 (7/2), 7-6 (7/5) and now shoots for the 122,700 US dollar winner's pay cheque in Sunday's final against American escapologist Brad Gilbert. Gilbert, the ninth seed, ear-

lier in the day clawed back from seeming defeat to upset third seed compatriot Pete Sampras, 1-6, 7-5, 6-3.

"It was a very tough one. I had to give my best shot to win tonfight," said Edberg. "I had problems with my timing in the first set and I did't serve

"The three times I broke his serve, he broke back straight away, but I came back and won the match in the

The semi was played against a backdrop of an emotional outpouring of Croat support for Ivanisevic, who this week de-

clared his allegiance to the strife-torn Yugoslav state. lvaniscvic, who slammed down an amazing 27 aces in his extraordinary quarter-final triumph over Agassi on Friday

night, came up with 10 un-

night, but the Croat's ground strokes were superior and almost brought off a major win. Edberge grappled with the Croat's thunderbolts and had to survive a Titanic seventh game in the second set when



The world no. 19 began confidently with an ace, but Edberg played the big points expertly. A corss-court volley set up match point and he clinched it when lyanisevic netted.

The explosive serve-volleyer congratulated Edberg, scooped up his bag and waved to his adoring supporters as he strode from the arena, beaten by the world No. 1 by two timebreakers.

"It feels bad because you're fighting almost for three hours an and then you lose by a couple of points," lvanisevic said at his news conference. "It's really tough to lose

against Stefan and you know you had a chance to beat him." Edberg leads Gilbert 10-4 in their head-to-head encoun-

ters but significantly the Californian won their last meeting 6-4 in the third set a Los Angeles in August. Gilbert, who is rated one of

the hardest opponents on the ATP tour because of his legendary "impossible" comebacks, has won 20 career titles to Edberg's 31. Edberg was runner-up to



Kenyan govt to probe alleged misuse of cash

NAIROBI, Oct 5: The Kenyan government is to investigate sports officials who were given 300,000 dollars for their team's expenses in the Catro All Africa Games, following reports that athletes went

penniless, reports AFP. The announcement was made by Sports Minister James Njiru, when he met the second batch of the Kenyan contingent who arrived in Natrobi on Thursday from Cario.

He said the officials "Would be investigated and those found guilty would be sacked and tried for frustrating athletes in a foreign country and embarrassing Kenya in front of

the world." The minister said he had personally released the money

before the team's departure. "Why an official was left behind in Natrobi with the money to let our athletes suffer is the question I am going to be told," he added.

According to reports reaching here during the Games, Kenyan athletes were detained at Cairo Airport for six hours for lack of registration fees and went without food on the first

day of the competition. Kenyan athletes had also threatened to boycott the Games after they were paid only a daily allowance of five dollars instead of the normal 10 dollars.

The athletes also had to share uniforms because the official kit from Adidas, which supplies free uniforms to Kenyan athletes before major competitions, had been stolen at Nairobi Airport in August.

Most of the sportsmen had threatened to seek an audience with President Daniel Arap Moi if Njiru, whose responsibility also include culture and social services, did not take action.

Njiru admitted that ministry officials were corrupt and promised a clean up, saying that the president and every Kenyan were dissatisfied with the sports administrators. Although Kenyan athletes

are respected world-wide, most administrators of sports associations have earned a bad name here for mistreatment of athletes and even stealing their money. The Cairo Games' manage-

ment committee secretary Robert Ouko, previously accused of stealing athletes money, demined that there was an embezzlement of money meant for the Kenyan contingent in Cairo.
