The Dhaka University campus turned into a battlefield Thursday night when rivals Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) and Chhatra League (S-A) traded heavy gunfire and exploded bombs.

Both the fighting groups claimed one activist injured on either side but declined to identify them.

The activists fired about 1000 rounds of bullets from their respective residential hall strongholds in the Arts Faculty area during the fighting that began at 7.30 pm and continued till our going to the press at 1.30 am.

Automatic weapons used in the fighting included cut rifles and pistols.

Our DU correspondent telephoned at about 12-30 am that a group of armed JCD activists had attacked the Jagannath hall.

Police cordoned the entire Arts Faculty area including the residential halls at around midnight raising apprehension of an early morning raid of the residential halls.
