Tea prices fall sharply at Ctg auction

Prices declined sharply as poor demand led to very large withdrawals at this week's tea auction sale held in Chittagong on Tuesday.

According to a Unity Brokers market reports, this sale was the poorest weekly sale this season in terms of quantity sold and level of prices, as about 68 per cent of the total offerings remained

Limited demand led prices to fall resulting in very large withdrawals particularly for the better brokens and where sold, prices declined sharply. Only a small quantity of good and medium Brokers were sold but at much lower rates. Prices of Fannings also weakened and rates decreased.

Iran and Pakistan alongwith the internal traders operated very selectively and at substantially reduced strength. Unconfirmed reports indicated that the import duty for Bangladesh tea to Pakistan has been raised from Rs. 26.15 to Rs. 30.

About 24,796 packages of tea were on offer at the auction sale. In the Leaf tea category 70 per cent remained unsold while export buyers accounted for 18 per cent of the sale and internal buyers bought

12 per cent of the offerings. In the Dust category 54 per cent remained unsold while internal buyers accounted for 54 per cent of the sale and export buyers bought 12 per cent

The next tea auction, Sale No 25 is scheduled to be held on October 22 and total offerings will comprise of about 28,500 packages of Leaf and another 3,500 packages of Dust. Following is the categorywise performance report of

Unity Brokers of the offerings at this week's sale: Orthodox : A small quantity sold at Taka 4.00 to Taka 5.00 below valuations. CTC: Much lower demand

resulted in substantial withdrawals. A nominal quantity of good and medium Brokers sold at between Taka 2.00 to Taka 3.00 below last levels. Plainer Brokers met with better demand but prices eased by Taka 1.00 to Taka 2.00. Selective Best lines realised between Taka 48.50 and Taka 50.80. Fannings initially sold at between Taka 2.00 and Taka 3.00 lower than last levels but as the sale progressed, prices eased further. Few internal popular types sold between Taka 51.00 and Taka 53.10.

Dust: 3,424 packages were on offer. Prices generally eased by about Taka 2.00 and Taka 3.00 with a large quantity remaining unsold.

Green Tea: 605 Packages were on offer and these generally sold at between Taka 61.50 and Taka 71.10.
