

Foundation will be laid by end of next year, hopes minister

WB reassessment report on Jamuna bridge by Nov

While a high-powered World Bank team was reassessing the viability of the Jamuna Bridge before giving its final report, Communications Minister Col (Rtd) Oli Ahmed Thursday hoped that the foundation of the bridge would be laid by the end of next year.

"I am hopeful about the bridge and the foundation will

be laid by the end of next year by the grace of Allah", he told this correspondent in an optimistic tone.

The Communications Minister led the Bangladesh side at the talks during the fortnight-long visit of the World Bank team.

The team will submit its report by end of November.

Meanwhile, the World Bank President Lewis T Preston assured Finance Minister Saifur · Rahman in Bangkok that a decision would be taken about the bridge project "very soon". Satfur Rahman told the World Bank President about the high priority the Bangladesh Government attached to the

Tempo drivers turn violent at rally

Bu Staff Correspondent Tempo drivers turned violent and created panic in front of National Press Club on Thursday suspecting that a man was carrying bombs at their rally, eyewitness and police sources said.

A group of agitated drivers caught one Shaheen who identified himself as a minibus driver from inside the Press Club and started beating him saying that he tried to detonate a bomb at the meeting.

Some two hundred drivers gathered at the venue with their tempos to protest the attack on Mokhlesur Rahman, General Secretary of the Dhaka City Auto-tempo Workers Union, by some armed toll collectors on October 9 at R K Mission Road. Rahman was seriously injured in the incident.

Police Sergeant on duty Abul Massan tried to rescue the victim but he himself was held by the mob and received blows from the unruly drivers. He lost his cap but managed to save his revolver.

Police deployed at the spot got on a police van and started retreating fearing attack.

The police sergeant was later rescued by another con tingent of police rushed to the

Police recovered a note book and a licence from Shaheen's pocket which the drivers had suspected as bomb. The recovered licence bearing Shaheen's photograph proved he was a minibus driver residing at Khilkhet area of the city.

His father's name is Lal Mia. After the incident the tempo workers announced their six-point demands at the rally which include immediate arrest of the attackers of the union president, measures against toll collectors and withdrawal of false cases against union leaders.

President of the union Rafigul Islam Pintu told The Daily Star that if their demands are not fulfilled by October 25, they would go for a half-day strike in the city.

Khaleda, Mahathir agree to expand trade, cooperation

HARARE, Oct 17: Bangladesh and Malaysia today agreed to increase bilateral trade and cooperation for the mutual benefit of the two countries, reports BSS.

This was decided at an exclusive meeting held between Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia and her Malaysian counterpart Dr Mahathir Mohammed at the International Conference Centre here this morning.

A spokesman said the two leaders exchanged views on bilateral, regional and international issues during their meeting lasting more than half an hour.

Dr Mahathir stressed that the two countries should maintain close link in all fields for mutual benefit of the two peoples.

He said the Joint Economic Commission meeting would be held in Malaysia this year where efforts would be made to increase trade between the two countries.

Dr Mahathir said Malaysia

would import manpower from Bangladesh both unskilled and skilled labourers and professionals including engineers and doctors. Malaysia would also extend


ARICHA, Oct 17: Bus strike on the Dhaka-Aricha highway was called off today following negotiations between the administration and transport union leaders, ending communication blockade between the capital and 36 northern and southern districts, reports

The Dhaka-Aricha Transport Workers Union called the wildcat strike after a showcause notice issued by the Dhaka 3rd Labour Court halted the trade union's election scheduled for October 18.

Gabtalf Bus Terminal Sramik Committee Secretary Shajahan Khan said the indefi nite strike was called off after 'successful" talks this afternoon with the Bangladesh Road Transport Authority Chairman and the Deputy Commissioner of Dhaka-North.

The authorities assured the union leaders of action against the four expelled members of the transport union and also of withdrawing the case filed against the union on October 14, he said.
