Outlines suggested for autonomy of Radio, Television

A structural outline to make the national media autonomous was adopted Wednesday after a two-day discussion sponsored by the Sammilita Sanskritik Jote held at the National Press

The 19-point recommendation to make the national media 'unbiased, impartial and people's media' were presented to Information Minister Nazmul Huda who also participated in the discussion.

Twentynine prominent speakers representing different sections of people including politicians, educationists, ministers and high government officials and journalists deliberated democratisation and autonomy to Radio and TV' to prepare

the guideline. Fayez Ahmed, President of the Jote, presided over the discussions. According to the proposed

structure, the autonomous organisation for the Radio and TV will be named as 'National Broadcasting Authority' (NBA) which will be headed by a Chairman. The Chairman would be

nominated by a committee of the Parliament and would be appointed by the President for three years, the appointment would be approved by the Parliament and the NBA would be responsible to it. The NBA Chairman could not be dismissed without two-third majority in the Parliament.
