## DOWN TO EARTH Victims of wrong diagnosis

By Khalilur Rahman

The extent of emotional shock of a man whose blood test shows that he is a carrier of deadly hepatitis-B virus can hardly be measured. Most of those carrying this type of virus in the country are detected during the process of their screening for employment abroad. Hepatitis-B virus infection disqualifies a recruit to get a job in a Middle-East country.

During the last few years most Middle-East countries have imposed restrictions on recruitment of persons suffering from hepatitis-B virus infection. Hepatitis is an ailment of the liver which is known to all as jaundice. An individual can be afflicted with this disease for a variety of reasons. But when the illness results from B virus infection it is pretty serious, doctors say.

The most incredible aspect of the episode does not relate to making the diagnosis of a case, but the wrong diagnosis in some cases. That means the blood test of a man without B virus infection can show him to be a carrier while the actual carrier is certified as non-carrier. This is the result of a wrong diagnostic method adopted by some pathological laboratories assigned to screen the recruits for overseas jobs. Seven to eight persons out of 100 are found to have B virus infection after laboratory test of their blood, sources told The Daily Star. Of them, some do not have at all any B virus infection while a few others certified by the laboratories as 'clean cases' are, in fact, the carriers of B virus, the sources added.

So, just for a rapid test one must not depend on the Latex method for determining a serious ailment like

Elaborating Prof Islam said that ELISA and RPHA were also very simple types of tech niques. These take a little more time for testing than Latex but the cost for examination is almost the same in all the three systems, he added. The Latex method should be discarded as has been done in the advanced countries. Prof Islam stated.

Referring to the seriousness of the problem Prof Islam, who is also general secretary of the National Aids Committee said lier conducted, revealed that about seven per cent of our population were carriers of hepatitis-B virus. These carriers are serving as the source of infection for the susceptible persons. A survey conducted in 1984 revealed that about 18 per cent of the professional blood donors in the metropolis were the carriers of B-virus.

Prof Islam said that there was no effective and specific treatment for chronic active hepatitis-B virus infection. Often it develops into cirrhosis and cancer of the liver. But the disease which spreads from man to man is preventable, he added.

Convenor of the resistance Committee Jahangir Alam, and members of the committee Badiuzzaman and Rafigul Islam.

It was decided at the meeting that the immediate task of the standing committee will be to locate all the underaged prostitutes in Tanbazar and arrange for their rehabili-

The meeting also decided to initiate a drive to eradicate alcohol and drug abuse from Narayanganj.

Earlier in the day, a protest rally bought out by the prostitutes were blocked by a heavy contingent of police at around 9 am. The DC and SP came to

the brothel area around noon. The inhabitants of the Tanbazar red-light district expressed their helplessness at the existing situation. They also conveyed their feeling of insecurity because of threats made by he Resistance Committee.

The district administration assured them protection against any attacks.

Meanwhile, the Resistance Committee continued to distribute leaslets around the town advocating participation in the protest rally Friday They also called on people, through loud speakers to gather at the Phalpatti area after Juma prayers to take part in the protest rally.

Dwelling on the past antiautocratic movement, the AL chief said that her party always stood for change of power through a constitutional way.

"I was always against martial law and chose the course of action accordingly for which I was often misunderstood", she added.

Hasina mentioned that the Ershad regime was compelled to handover power peacefully under constitutional provisions as suggested by her on November 6 last year.

The AL chief alleged that an 'invisible power' has been controlling everything in the country and said. "Awami League wanted to save the nation from such an invisible power and restore constitutional rule."

When asked about her views on the campus situation. Sheikh Hasina said the government could stop the violence if it desired.

She maintained that it was not difficult for government to plug the sources of arms supply to the campuses.

She alleged that the ruling party wanted to reign over all the educational institutions which resulted in widespread violence on the campuses. She mentioned that a number of Chhatra League workers were killed by the BNP-backed student organisation in the recent

Hasina held the government responsible for the use of arms on the campuses and said "Without government patronage, none can carry arms in the campus."

The AL chief also alleged that Jagannath Hall, Zahurul Haque Hall, and SM Hall of the Dhaka University came under several police raids for the recovery of arms. But police did never raid Mohsin Hall, Surja Sen Hall, Zia Hall and Bangabandhu Hall where the ruling party's student wing had
