Sixteen players moved into the second round of the twoday qualifying meet with five of them- four from Bangladesh and one form Italy- having received first- round byes. The Bangladesh who received byes vesterday were Ahsan Roni Azeem, Layes Quasem, Masudur Rahman and Mohammad Babu while the Italian player was Fabrizio Bertani.

## Rookie pros reach semis

Habsudova reached the semifinals for the first time as professionals on Friday with wins in the 150,000 dollar Arizona Tennis Classic, reports Reuter.

Rubin, playing in only her second tournament since turning professional at the US Open in September, beat unseeded compatriot Ginger Helgeson 6-3, 7-5, while the hard-hitting Habsudova, 18, defeated American Kimberly Po 4-6, 6-1, 6-3.

Rubin and Habsudova will meet in one of today's semifinals, with third-seeded Sabine Appelmans of Belgium going

The quality of the ten other matches on the opening day were too poor to warrant mention. Five of them produced 0-6, 0-6 whitewashes, three produced 6-0, 6-1 results, one ended 6-1, 6-1 while the other finished 6-0,

ATP computer in accordance with their performances. This is for the first time that professional players from around the world - twenty from nine countries at the last count - are taking part in the maiden professional tour-

nament of the country. The Dhaka leg of the circuit is being sponsored by Bangladesh Tobacco Company who will be bearing all local expenses except prize-money.





## Anand upsets Kasparov

TILBURG, Nethrlands, Nov 2: Indian Grandmaster Viswanathan Anand inflicted a sensational defeat on Friday on world champion Garry Kasparov, his first loss in this year's Interpolis Tilburg tournament, reports Reuter.

With two rounds left to play in the 14-round tournament, Kasparov's lead over the second-placed Anand, a former funior world champion, has been cut to just one point.

If Anand wins his adjourned 11th round game against Gata Kamsky he will be level with Kasparov, who set his heart on winning this competition against strong opposition after failing to win either of the two other tournaments he has entered this year.

Kasparov, playing black, plunged in to the Najdorf variation of Kasparov's Sicilian defence, one of the sharpest lines in this opening.

Anand, playing in his usual fast style, castled short on move eight, much earlier than usual.

"This move looked very

dangerous (for Anand)," Dutch International Master Cornelius Van Wijgerden said.

Kasparov snapped up a "poisoned pawn," on the b-file with a deep penetration by his



queen, but leaving Anand with a favourable central posting for his knight.

# ITF Satellite circuit comes to town: A preview

A new chapter is being written in the history of the tennis movement in Bangladesh

with the com mencement of the first leg of the ITF Satellite Tennis Circuit jointly being staged in Bangladesh and Pakistan.

This has been possible largely due to the enthusiasm of the International Tennis Federation to expand upon its global development plans and operations and the initiative of some diehard tennis loverscum- organisers in Pakistan. eager to put that country on the map of professional tennis.

Bangladesh's contribution in its materialisation has largely been through the attendance of a conference of the ITF last year when this idea of holding a circuit spanning two countries and four cities was first conceived. The rest of the sequence of events apparently have come about as a result of

been picked out of the hat. The format is quite simple. Players entering the main event will be awarded circuit points based on their performance. Incidentally, even a first round loser in the main draw is ensured one circuit point. At the end of the third leg in Lahore, the top 24 ctrcuit point holders go on to play the Masters' tournament in Karachi in the last week of November. It is based on the performances in the Masters that the circuit points earned by a player will be converted into ATP points in a pre-detemined ratio, thus enabling a player to obtain or enhance his

ranking as a professional. The ITF supervisor is Peter Malik of India for the two legs in Bangladesh and Sultan Gangi

Incidentally, the men's doubles event will be a main draw event only comprising sixteen teams. Fifteen shall have to qualify on merit, that is, computer points and the remaining team will be given a wild card. Since teams from both Bangladesh and Pakistan will be in contention for this clusive spot, it remains to be seen how our great Bangladesh Tennis Federation works around this. Perhaps a Bangladeshi team in favour with the BTF will be given the wild card for the two Bangladeshi legs while the Pakistan Tennis Federation will nominate their best team for the Lahore leg.

LOCAL ORGANISATION The Bangladesh Tennis Federation have scaled new heights and set new standards in inefficiency at conducting an event of this level. Their PR has been non-existent. An interesting feature is that the top three players of the coun-

try, the nucleus of the Davis

Cup team that has served the country creditably in spite of their limitations and helped keep some of the jobs of some cholesterol laden BTF officials are mysteriously missing. There has been no effort expended to help put up a credible local challenge. The excrcise has simply revolved around scratching each other's back. For instance, a player who has never made the grade either as a junior or senior has been given a wild card simply to appease him since the BTF officials are of the mistaken impression that he represents the local tennis players' body! They have totally shunned the incumbent achievers deliber ately but for reasons best known to them. There was really enough room for all of us to compete. If the intention is to create an opportunity for the next generation the BTF would do well to do their homework. They should know that youngsters have to be blooded very carefully and under proper tutelage, not under

purely to effect personal gain. But how can we expect better management from the BTF? It is essentially the same team minus a few kingpins of the former regime. There has only been a re-shuffling of portfolios with a few new faces. It is really sad but this is just a reflection of the reversal of the domino effect. Whereas, literally, every country and organisation is going from good to better, we seem to be revelling in the act of going from bad to

A CASE IN POINT Already there is grumbling behind the scenes. This correspondent was told by some sources wishing to remain anonymous that there is a wider discrepancy between the fees of a linesman and an unpire than was agreed upon or is decent.
