Kudrat Ali, then a young man, accompanied the Raja on his hunting expedi-

Kudrat Ali is remarkably independent. He does not bother others unless he has to. His

great-great-grand daughter waits on him to help him here and there. His habits are well known to his great-grand daughter-in-law, who also takes care of him.

"God's world, the sun, the moon and the sky are my old friends", the old man muses. "All other people of my age have left the earth." Kudrat Ali has a strong mental preparation to see many more dawn breaking in this world. His life, he knows will be as Allah has destined it to be.



Plea to bring out health procession in rural areas to help combat TB

The Deputy Leader of the House, Prof A Q M Badruddoza Chowdhury, Tuesday called for waging a social movement on the basis of community participation to combat the curse of communicable diseases like tuberculosis and leprosy, reports BSS.

Inaugurating a day-long annual national council of Bangladesh National Associa tion of Tuberculosis (NATAB) at the auditorium of National Museum, Prof. Chowdhury, who is also the President of NATAB, said side by side mass awareness about the health education and strong political commitment was necessary to combat and the menace of tuberculosis, leprosy and other communicable diseases.

If we really want to ensure health for all by the year 2000, people from all sagments, particularly the political leaders, workers, teachers, and religious leaders should put in their concerned efforts toward this direction for serving the suffering humanity, Prof. Chowdhury asserted.

Presided over by Vice-President of NATAB and City Awami League President Mozaffor Hossain Paltu, the inaugural session of the council was addressed by Project Director of the Government Dr A K M Ahsan Ali, Secretary General of NATAB, Dr Sakhawat Hossain, President of Rajshahi NATAB, Prof Latif, President of Habiganj NATAB and Chairman Habiganj Pourasabha, Shahid Chowdhury, General Secretary of Bagerhat NATAB, Mostafizul Hug, and a Japanese volunteer working in Bangladesh under NATAB programme Minako Omari.

About 80 councillors from all over the country attended the council.

Prof. Chowdhury pointed out that during the last nine vears of autocratic rule, there was lack of political commitment to combat the curse of leprosy and other communicable diseases.

Now after the establishment of a democratic accountable government, all quarters including those who were in power and those who want to go to power in future must take responsibility for the prevention of these diseases.

Prof. Chowdhury said there was no reason to take the problems of tuberculosis so lightly. He, however, said that the sincere efforts on the part of government and voluntary agencies dealing with the disease, 98 per cent of the patients could be treated in their own houses.

In this connection, he pleaded for supplying medicines the patients on regular basis. Half treatment would endanger the life of the patients as well as spread the disease in a severe manner.

Prof. Chowdhury suggested to continue the programme of BCG vaccination among the children and provision of better quality drugs to eradicate the curse of tuberculosis and Appreciating the role of the

NATAB, in curbing tuberculosis and leprosy, Prof Chowdhury urged the NATAB volunteers to revitalise their organisation with vigorous health education programme. He advised them to bring

out health processions in the villages once a week and enrol young NATAB members throughout the country. During the processions, placards inscribing the lessons of primary health care like how to keep

the environment clean should be carried out, he said.

In his Presidential speech, the NATAB Vice President Mozaffor Hossain Paltu paid tributes to the Deputy Leader of the House Prof B Chowdhury in pioneering the role of curbing tuberculosis in the country.

Paltu said NATAB, a social voluntary organisation had been working to serve the cause of the distressed humanity.

Though we belong to different views and parties but when we assemble under the banner of NATAB, we keep only one objective of serving the people. The Secretary General of

NATAB Dr Sakhawat Hussain gave a resume of the activities of the NATAB since its inception in the 70s and pleaded for evolving a low cost tuberculosis control programme. He pointed out that there

was a reasonably good health care structure in the country and said if we could work properly it would not be difficult to control the disease. Project Director for tuber-

culosis control of the govern-

ment, Dr A K M Ahsan Ali

called for integrated approach to combat the curse of tuberculosis and leprosy.

He said the government had already taken up some model clinic at Savar, Dhamrai and Bancharampur upazilas for the treatment of tuberculosis and leprosy.
