'IAF can hit any target in Pakistan'

NEW DELHI, Nov 8: The Indian Air Force (IAF), the world's sixth largest, can hit any target in Pakistan, Air Chief Marshal Nirmal Chandra Suri said today, reports AFP.

The IAF "is capable of hitting any target in Pakistan which is inimical towards India," the Press Trust of India (PTI) quoted the Chief of Air Staff as telling reporters in northern city of Chandigarh.

He said the IAF was not aware of any specific military camp which New Delhi says exist in Pakistan to train Sikh and Muslim guerillas fighting for secession in India.

"We do not know about any camp. We only know our targets inimical to our country wherever they may be and we act whenever we are called upon to do so," the IAF emer

He said the IAF was in "a happy position vis-a-vis the air power of neighbouring countries.

Roh's pledge to eliminate nuclear weapons

SEOUL, Nov 8 : President Roh Tae-woo pledged for the first time Friday to eliminate nuclear weapons in South Korea and urged long time rival North Korea to reciprocate by halting nuclear weapons development, reports AP.

Roh's urgent demand for a nuclear-free peninsula comes amid escalating international pressure to force North Korea to open its nuclear facilities to inspection as a means to secure peace in North Asia.

Intelligence reports indicate Communist North Korea, the most isolated hard-line regime in the world today, is nearing capability to produce nuclear weapons and atomic bombs.

Major's party suffers defeat

LONDON, Nov 8: Prime Minister John Major's Conservative Party suffered defeat in three by-elections for vacant parliamentary seats with only months to go to a British general election, official results showed today, reports Reuter.

The Conservatives lost two seats they had won with slim majorities at the 1987 general election: "Langbaurgh in northeast England was won by the main opposition Labour Party, and Kincardine and Deeside in Scotland was won by the centrist Democrats.

50 feared killed as bus plunges into Titas river

At least fifty people are feared killed when a passenger bus plunged into river Titas at Shahbajpur ferry ghat on the Dhaka-Sylhet highway, 15 killometres off Brahmanbaria on Friday, according to Deputy Commissioner, Brahmanbaria.

The overloaded bus from Brahmanbaria on way to Madhabpur plunged into the river a little after 2 pm while boarding the ferry. Survivors and local people complained that the helper was driving the bus at that time.

Deputy Commissioner of Brahmanbaria told The Daily Star at 12 midnight that divers with heavy crane and modern equipment reached the spot from Dhaka. Heavy crane from the Ashuganj Fertilizer Factory and other local efforts fatled to salvage the bus or recover bodies from the ill fated woodbodied bus till 11-30 pm, he said. He apprehended, the bus at least 50 feet under water, might have been broken into pieces, frustrating all rescue efforts by the fertiliser factory

The Deputy Commissioner who, along with Superintendent of Police had rushed to the spot after the accident also told that he feared only those on the roof of the bus might have survived and all inside it were trapped. See Page 12 Col. 4
