Drinking water scarce

Nov 16: Many tubewells have either been rendered inoperative or choked up causing scarcity of drinking water in the district.

According to the sources, most tubewells went out of order due to poor maintenance and shortage of spares.

Villagers alleged that tubewells with plastic pipes often choked up within a short time of installation. The Public Health Engineering Department sank 1300 tubewells in different parts of the district last year but most of them remained ineffective as the authorities did not take any steps to repair them. As a result, wheat cultivation of current season may decline, farmers feared.

Besides, the number of tubewells are inadequate to cope with the rising need.

Meanwhile, gastro-intestinal diseases have broken out in many parts of the district due to paucity of pure water.

20 die of diarrhoea

Nov 16: At least 20 people died of diarrhoea and 200 others were attacked by the disease in three unions of Palash and Narsingdi Sadar upazila during the last ten days, reports UNB.

According to informed sources, of the total, five died in Ghorasal union, 7 in Amedia and 8 in Panchdona union.

Local people complained that no effective measures have vet been taken to check the spread of the disease.

PHE to install 380 deep tubewells

Nov 16: The Public Health Engineering Department (PHED) with the help of UNICEF will install 380 deep tubewells in different upazilas of Bhola district for supplying of pure drinking water in rural areas at a cost of Tk. 1,55, 13,548, reports BSS.

According to an official source, of the total tubewells, 72 will be installed in Bhola Sadar: 72 in Borhanuddin upazila, 25 in Tazumuddin, 24 in Daulatkhan, 73 in Lalmohan, 90 in Charlession and 24 in Manpura upazilas of the dis-

The installation work of the tubewells will be completed by the end of December next, the source said. When completed, over 1.50 lakh people of the district will get pure water.

4000 metric tons wheat to repair Muhuri embankment

Nov 16 About 4000 metric tons of wheat have been sanctioned for repairing the breaches of Muhuri embankment at Pourshuram and Chhagalnaiya upazilas under food-for-work programme during the current financial

Profiteers trading on human miseries

HABIGANJ, Nov 16: Food crisis has been gradually increasing throughout the district following the aftermath of the recent flood. The middle class and the fixed income groups are the worst sufferers. On the other hand, prices of essential commodities have recorded a sharp rise in the different markets for the last few weeks multiplying the sufferings of general consumers.

In different markets rice is being sold at Taka 12 to 13 per kilo, atta at Taka 10 to 12 per kilo, red chilli at Taka 85 to 100 per kilo, onion at Taka 22 to 24, salt at Taka 7 to 8, soyabean at Taka 40 to 42 per litre, masur pulse at Taka 28 to 30, sugar at Taka 33 to 35, kerosine at Taka 16 to 18 per

The price of vegetables has risen 1.80 per cent on an average. The price of milk has also gone up by Taka 2 to 4 per seer. The prices of all varieties of powdered milk have registered an increase of 4.20 per

65 projects to be implemented under Barisal edn zone

BARISAL, Nov16 : Education Ministry will implement 65 projects at a cost of Tk 7.83 crore in five southern districts under Barisal education zone during the current financial year, reports UNB.

The districts are: Barisal, Jhalakathi, Bhola, Pirojpur and Patuakhali.

According to an official source, 56 projects will be financed by the Islamic Development Bank (IDA) and the rest by the International Development Agency (IDA).

The projects to be implemented include the construction of six two-storeyed primary schools in the town, 47 rural primary schools, nine senior madrashas and three office buildings for the education' directorate officers. Of the total, Tk 96.42 lakh

will be spent for the con-

CHANDPUR, Nov 16 : The government has sanctioned about Taka two crores for the Chandpur town protection scheme in the current season, reports BSS.

According to Chandpur Water Development Board office, about 80 per cent repair works of the scheme has been completed. About 2.60 lakh cubic feet boulders were dumped along the bank of the river Meghna at Nutunbazar and Puranbazar areas. Protection work at BIWTA

Raypur Kawmi Jute Mills, the biggest mill of northern part of the country is on the verge of closure due to unabated use of synthetic products, reports

According to official sources, about 5000 tons of jute products worth about Tk 1.25 crore remained unsold due to its low demand in the market. As a result, about 50 looms of the mills were closed down over the last three months throwing at least 5000

Mill sources said Nepal Pakistan, Thailand and China are products fine quality jute goods and are selling in international markets at competitive prices, but in Bangladesh the cost of production of fine quality jute goods is high. So the local products cannot compete in the international

Ferry service between Sirajganj and Bhuapur route snapped from October 29 due to drop in the water level. Riverine communication of this route remained disrupted for nearly two months last


