COX'S BAZAR : Less than half a mile away from Bangladesh Parjatan Corporation's (BPC) flagship hotel, Shaibal the smashed rutns of a coastal police sentry post lie on the gleaming white sandy beach. Red ceramic bricks and white clay foundation stone bear the name of Maj Gen Abdul Mannaf as the man who inaugurated the post back in August, 1982, when he was the region's martial law

dministrator. The ruins stand as one of the few visible reminders of the force of the 20ft tidal wave that swept through this tourist town April 29 last. Nine years later the idea of a coastal police too seems to have been swept away by the tide, as police patrols on the beach are conspicuous only by their ab-

"Lack of adequate security arrangements is a major obstacle to the development of this town as a tourist resort. What's more, there are no lifesavers or rescue teams on the' beach either'. Mohammad Ashrarul Hug, manager of the Hotel Sayeman complained.



1200 killed as troops clash with Karens

BANGKOK, Nov 22: About 1,200 civilians, soldiers and guerillas have been killed in six weeks of heavy clashes be- month of fighting in the tween Burmese troops and Karen-led ethnic guerillas in the lower central Irrawaddy delta, a rebel group said today, reports Reuter.

A Karen National Union (KNU) statement said Rangoon had launched concerted ground, air and sea attacks against rebel forces in the Irrawaddy region west of the capital since last month causing heavy casualties to civilians.

The KNU estimated that over 800 civilians died during the latest government campaign in the region where, it said, the Karens had trained and armed about 3,000 men and students to fight government troops.

It said Rangoon had forcibly evacuated more than 30 Karen villages in the delta and destroyed schools, hospitals and houses suspected of harbouring the rebels.

The group said 375 government troops and 27 Karen rebels had been killed in battles since early October. Independent confirmation of the figures was not immediatcly available.
