

WB meets today to give 'final say' on Jamuna bridge

The World Bank is likely to spell out its final position on financing the Jamuna Multipurpose Bridge at a meeting today in Washington, reports UNB.

Highly placed official sources said the bridge would be the main agenda of Wednesday's World Bank board meeting which may give its

"final say" on the project.

In the wake of the decisive meeting, the government is learnt to be optimistic about go-ahead from the Bank as the recalculated ERR(Economic Rate of Return) from the 500 million-dollar Jamuna Multipurpose Bridge Project has been found to be much higher than earlier estimates.

The crucial meeting will evaluate the findings of the World Bank mission that visited Bangladesh Sept 25- Oct 12 to collect data on economic return from the bridge compared to that from improved ferry service and update the project cost in current prices.

Government's latest assessment, which found the ERR much above the WB rating, will also come up at the meeting for a comparative cvaluation, sources said.

Both foreign consultants calculations and that of the government, done in last October, have found a roadcum- powerline bridge much more viable than an improved ferry service across the major river Jamuna.

Justice BA Siddiky dead

Justice BA Siddiky died Tuesday at the Holy Family Hospital following protracted illness. He was 77.

He was suffering from diabetes, asthma and other old age ailments.

A former Chief Justice of the then East Pakistan, Justice Siddiky held many important posts home and abroad. While Chief Justice, he refused to administer oath of office to Gen Tikka Khan the then governor of East Pakistan in 1971. He was also the President of a faction of Bangladesh Muslim

He was a former permanent representative of Bangladesh to the United Nation, Chairman of Bangladesh Red Cross Society (now Red Crescent Society), Vice-Chairman of the Geneva-based International League of Red Cross and the Red-Crescent Society.

He was also the Attorney General in the then East Pakistan.
