## Tinbigha accord doesn't mean transfer: Delhi

NEW DELHI, Dec 5: Government today ruled out any review of the 1974 and 1982 agreements with Bangladesh on the Tinbigha Corridor asserting that even the Supreme Court has held that the whole controversy on the matter was a 'fight on a non-issue', reports PTI.

The Minister of State for External Affairs, Eduardo Faleiro, told LK Advant during question hour that the guestion of the review of the agreements never arose even when the non-Congress governments were in power.

He said that it was a misconception to assume that any transfer of Indian territory was involved in granting the Corridor, under the agreements, only a right of access to its enclaves was being cre-

ated for Bangladesh and the Corridor would continue to remain part of India, he said. Faleiro said that it has been

cansistently held by the courts - from a single judge of the Calcutta High Court to a division bench of the Supreme Court - that no secession of territory was involved in the matter. He assured the House that he would place on the table of the House a copy of the judgement of the Supreme Court itself today.

While Advant said that a lease in perpetuity of the Corridor would lead to lapse of Indian sovereignty over the territory and it would mean it was a virtual transfer, Somnath Chatterjee (CPI-M) thanked the Minister for removing misgivings on the issue. See Page 12 col 6

## Recession shows no recovery

## Terry Anderson in Germany

WIESBADEN (Germany). Dec 5: A jubilant Terry Anderson was reunited Thursday at this way station for freed hostages with sister Peggy Say, who lobbied presidents and prime minister in a dogged campaign to get him freed, reports AP.

"What can I say? It's just great. It's been so long," said the 44- year-old journalist, the last American hostage in Lebanon, from the steps of the US military hospital.

In an intermittent predawn rain, more than 200 shouting and whooping people greeted the chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press, who was freed Wednesday after 2,455 days in captivity.

He held the hand of his 6year-old daughter Sulome, whom he met for the first time after he was driven to Syria on Wednesday.

Mrs Say dashed forward. gave him a huge hug and stroked his face after he stepped down from the helicopter that shuttled him from a nearby US air base.

They held each other tightly and rocked back and forth. On the hospital steps she stood at his side, wiping tears of joy from her eyes

"Welcome Home" and "Merry Christmas" yelled people in the crowd, many of them packed on the balconies of two floors of the hospital.

A recent study conducted by the Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and Industry (MCCI) shows that the economy was in a nose-down situation during the first four months (July-October) of the current fiscal year. Economic experts say that the situation did not show any improvement in November also. The industrial production

gripped the country.

in almost all sectors declined between six and 30 per cent. Steel, jute and urea production bore the brunt of the slump. Production of jute goods declined by 15 per cent, steel by

30 per cent and urea by 12 per

The production in export oriented industries also declined except for the garment sector. The poor performance of the industrial sector can be related to the overall slump in economy, inadequate credit facilities and labour unrest, according to the MCCI study.

The slower production trend was also met by a decline in sales for a wide range of items. The worst sale was recorded in steel sector. It fell by about 47 per cent.

Although the export earning during the July-October period

increased by about 8 per cent in Dollar terms compared with the corresponding period of the last fiscal year, the increase was mainly due to high performance of the garment sector. Export earning from all other major sectors

The economic stagnation also caused a fall in import despite a comfortable foreign exchange reserves position. Imports during the first quarter of fiscal 1991-92 was lower by about Taka 700 crore than the same period last fiscal The export during the first

fell during the period.
