Boro paddy farming plan

Dec 27 : Mymensingh Agriculture Extension Department (AED) will bring about 2,70,000 acres of land under Boro paddy cultivation during the current season in 12 upazilas of the district.

Mr Nastruddin Bhutyan, Deputy Director of AED said, about 2,52,000 tons of Boro paddy is likely to be produced in the district.

Of the total land, 23,000 acres will be brought under Boro paddy in Sadar, 21,900 acres in Muktagacha, 24,000 acres in Fulbaria. 29,500 acres in Trishal, 23,757 acres in Bhaluka, 24,800 acres in Gaffargoan, 24,000 acres in Nandail, 11,500 acres in Gouripur, 35,000 acres in Fulpur, 32,120 acres in Haluaghat, 13,000 acres in Dhubaura upazila in Mymensingh district.

AED will provide agri - inputs and disburse HYV seeds among the farmers.

Armed terrorists active in Narsingdi

Free, fair UP polls uncertain

NARSHINGDI, Dec 27 : Peaceful holding of the coming Union Parishad Election here has become uncertain due to rampant activities of the outlawed political parties including so-called Sarbahar Party in the district, reports UNB. Al least 50 people were

killed and many others injured in the district by the outlawed political groups, during the last one year, police said.

Armed terrorists have been very active in Sadar, Polash, Shelepur, Monohardi, Belabo and Raipur upazilas.

The situation worsened after the killing of a prospective UP election candidate recently. Local leaders of different political party's, police and administration sources told

Several incidents of violence were reported during the submission of nomination papers, they said, adding "it might affect the holding of free and fair election".

Most of the popular leaders are not contesting in the election and leaving their residences as they are feeling in-A local Awami League leader

termed the law and order situation alarming adding that the UP election would be influenced by the outlawed armed groups. He feared that the voters

might be forced by the armed groups to cast votes in favour of their chosen candidates. A senior police officer said

the armed thugs expanded their activities in the rural areas also and patronised by local influential people. Meanwhile, the government has declared a general amnesty

to the members of the Sarbahara and other outlawed organisations and urged them to lay down their arms and ammunition by January 8. But the local leaders ex-

pressed doubts if it would create any dent to the district. They urged the law enforcing agencies to take effective

measures to ensure voter's sccurity during the Union Parishad Election.

Separate cases filed in 1989

against two Union Parishad chairmen of Sadar upazila for misappropriation of wheat worth about Taka 8 lakh, still remain suppressed, local leaders alleged.

The two persons of Hajipur and Alokabli unions are again contesting for the forthcoming Union Parishad Election.

Sources said the two chairmen lifted a huge quantity of wheat given for Fool-for-Work Programme and they submitted false master rolls to the authorities to show that the distribution of wheat was done and work completed.

But on allegation from the local people, an investigation team from Relief Ministry visited the unions and found that no work had been done.

The Bureau of Anti Corruption filed two separate cases against the two chairmen but proceedings have not started in the last two years. The cases are now being,

Over one million people affected

Kaptai Lake water polluted

RANGAMATI, Dec 27 Death stalks along the three thousand mile Kaptai Lake which criss-cross the three districts of the Chittagong Hill Tracts with its vast blue water contaminated beyond safe limit, reports UNB.

Over one hundred people of the lake area died of various water-borne diseases in the last nine months by taking the polluted water of the lake. Of them, 61 died of diarrhoea in November alone.

More than one lakh others have complaints of intestinal disorder unaware of the source which, the public health experts say, is the lake-water.

The lake-water contains bacteria in alarming proportions which may kill a consumer with cholera, diarrhoea, typhoid or any other intestinal diseases within a short period, health specialists said.

Public health experts and environment specialists recently conducted a sample study to determine how far the lake water was safe for drink-

Chemical tests revealed that about 7,500 coliform bacteria existed in 100 mili-litre of the lake water, where only 2 bacteria are said to be hygienically safe for drinking. The specialists, according

to a source, had been shocked to find the bacteria content so high and expressed their concern to the local authorities. More than a million people in the 3 hill district consume

water of the Kaptai Lake which is apparently clean. More depressing is that dangerous bacteria infestation has also been noticed in the

after supplied from the treat-

ment plants. Public health experts tested water supplied from the treatment plant of the Rangamati town and found 300 coliform bacteria in one hundred mili-litre. Hotels and restaurants were also serving

dangerous coliform-infested water to their customers, they

The Environment Directorate warned restaurant owners that action would be taken against them if water to their customers were not found germ free. Specialists said treated wa-

ter and tap-water in the hotels and restaurants are contaminated by the lake water which mixes with the supplied water in one way or the other. The Rangamati Pourashava

Chairman Mahbubur Rahman said, water tanks and pipe lines remain unclean for years which was another reason for contamination of treated water. The municipal authorities could not do the job for fund shortage, he said.

But other sources said most of the tubewells in the three districts had either gone out of order or did not sink deep enough to reach the ground water level.

Use of firewood in brickfield unabated

SIRAJGANJ, Dec 27: The use of firewood including small

trees and bamboo roots in brick-fields of 16 northern

districts is unabated. Despite government ban, firewood is widely used in about 700 brick-fields of the northern districts.

It is learnt that these brickfields are in production with single and double chimnis and the owners have collected huge quantity of firewoods for the purpose.

The government banned the use of firewood in brickfields and supplying coal for the purpose. There are 20 coal depots for supply of fuel in Rajshahi Division, it is informed.

The brick-fields owners are more interested in using firewoods in place of coal. As a result, the coal in the depots remain unsold, it is informed. While contacted, some brick-field owners disclosed

rice, suji and fruits can meet the deficiency of vitamin. The village people are poor but they can arrange homemade items for their words, child specialists expressed. A

40,000 villagers to get electric connections

SYLHET. Dec 27: The works on the massive Rural Electrification Programme (REB) have been going on in seven upazilas of Sylhet dis-

According to an official source, the programme is financed by the World Bank and being implemented by the Rural Electrification Board. When contacted, the

General Manager, Sylhet Palli Biddut Samity informed this correspondent that, 965 kilometres power distribution line would be constructed in seven upazilas of the district. The upazilas are: Sylhet Sadar, Golapganj, Beantbazar, Jakiganj, Balganj, Biswanath and Fenchugani.

In total, 2315 villages in 65 unions of these upazilas would be covered by the programme. About 40,000 connections including domestic and commercial would be provided with the electricity facilities, the source informed.

Under the project, four power sub-stations of 5 M.V.A. capacity each and one of 10 M.V.A. capacity had already been constructed by the Board at Golapganj, Balaganj,
