MELBOURNE, Dec 28 : India appea-

India crumbled in the face of aggressive fast bowling by Bruce Reid, who followed his six-wicket first innings haul with three more wickets, and Craig McDermott, who picked up two scalps.

Only Sanjay Manjrekar, who made 30, showed any confidence before gloving a brutish McDermott delivery to Mark Taylor at slip.

Five balls later the same fielder caught captain Mohammad Azharuddin who set a reckless example by slashing at Reid after just four minutes at the crease.

India had competed well during the morning session after the Australians had resumed at 215 for five.

But wicketkeeper Ian Healy, who made 60, led some spirited tailend resistance which produced 87 runs for the last three wickets. Australia were eventually dismissed for 349—a lead of 86.

The responsibility of controlling the innings was thrust upon Healy by the early morning dismissal of Geoff Marsh for 86.

Marsh had added only seven to his overnight score when he fell to Kapil Dev, who went on to take five wickets in a test innings for the 22nd time. Marsh apart, Australia's



Botham suspects being set up

LONDON, Dec 28: England cricketer Ian Botham hinted on Friday that he thought he could have been set up after police said they found a suspicious substance, believed to be cannabis, at his rented seaside villa, reports Reuter.

Police found the substance in a part of the house at Poole in Southern England which was not betng used by Botham when they investigated what looked like a burglary there on Christmas Day.

Botham was away spending Christmas in the Channel Islands when neighbour saw a broken window and called the po-

Reporters asked Botham on Friday if he thought the drugs had been planted and he replied that, although there had been a break in. none of his possessions was

You can draw your own conclusions from that, but you don't have to be Einstein to work this one out, do you?" he said.


Police detective inspector Chris Dennis said: "We are keeping an open mind about the circumstances of this case." Botham had been very

cooperative and police were happy with what he had told them, he added. The cricketer is appear-

ing in 'Jack and the Beanstalk*, a Christmas pantomime Bournemouth, a seaside resort near Poole, until Monday when he is due to join the England cricket squad which is touring New

Zealand. He was booed on his first night on stage earlier this month after a newspaper report said he found Bournemouth "boring".

Advertisers shy away from Magic Johnson

LOS ANGELES, Dec 28: Major US advertisers who said they would continue to use Magic Johnson are starting to back away from the former basketball superstar, reports AFP.

Since Johnson announced last month that he had contracted the AIDS virus, companies have put plans to feature him in television commercials on hold, advertising industry sources said.

Pepsi is not expected to renew its contract with Johnson when it expires next summer and Nestle Chocolate is hedging on a new television ad that was to air in February.

"You can't afford to take the chance that a fairly large population might look upon Magic Johnson's conduct as not exemplary," said Marty Blackman, whose New York firm advises companies on the use of celebrities in advertising.

Most of the corporations with which Johnson had contracts voiced their support for the Los Angeles Lakers guard after he retired on November 7. Most still say they will contribute to his AIDS research and education foundation.

*Companies will fully support his public commitment to AIDS - and refrain from using him in active advertising," Blackman said. "But you won't find any

new companies coming on board." One notable exception is

Converse, the shoe manufacturer which has been involved with Johnson since he joined the National Basketball Association in Converse is going ahead

with plans to feature Johnson in television ads to be aired during the Barcelona Olympics next year.

England upbeat about NZ tour



LONDON, Dec 28: England's cricketers set out for New Zealand on Friday intent on using their three-Test series as

springboard for a successful World Cup campaign, reports Reuter.

Graham Gooch and his players privately admit the World Cup is their main goal but, with the final 14-man squad still to be finalised, there are considerable incentives for every member of the tour party.

England will also be aiming to crack New Zealand's enviable unbeatable home Test series record which stretches back 12 years. They were last beaten 1-0 by Pakistan in

Under the command of team manager Micky Stewart, England have undergone a rigorous pre-tour fitness cam-

paign for the three-month trip and chairman of selectors Ted Dexter believes the signs are encouraging. "Our planned preparation

has been as good as we can make it, given that we have been in the middle of Winter". Dexter said. The message is: 'So far, so good.' The New Zealand

itinerary has been the subject of long, hard negotiation and I believe it is a sound preparation for the World Cup. We go with high expectations." England have three first-

class warm-up matches before the first Test in Christchurch starting on January 18, but have opted to travel with only one specialist opener. New vice-captain Alec

Stewart and youngster Mark Ramprakash are expected to vie for the vacant opening berth alongside Gooch, with all-rounder lan Botham coming

into consideration for the World Cup programme starting on February 22. Botham will finally swap his

pantomime tights for cricket gear next month when he joins the tour party after first Test. He can expect to find himself pitched into a heated battle for all-rounder's places, also involving Phillip DeFreitas, Chris Lewis, Derek Pringle and
