

## Graeme Wood quits prolific run-scorer. PERTH, Jan 8:




Former Test opening batsman Graeme Wood confirmed Wednesday that he will quite first-class cricket immediately,

The Leeward Islands will have to name a new captain for the Cup, starting on January 24, following the announcement that Richards is unavail-

He was named captain of a Leewards training squad last year but has since said publicly that he will not play in the Cup nor the Regional limited overs tournament beginning on January 20.

Richards, who retired from Test cricket after last year's tour of England, told a Barbados radio station on Sunday he would like to end his international career at the World Cup in Australia and New Zealand in February and March.

# World Series Triangulars: Retrospect and Prospect

in the first half seven matches were played in December and Australia, the favourites are leading the table with eight points from five matches, 'nd'a have five points from five and the West Indies have collected only a solitary point from their four matches.

The Australians registered victories against the Windies in two matches and out of the three games against India, they lost the first and won the remaining two. The Indians tied their first match against the West Indies and won the other; against Australia the won the first encounter and lost the next two. The West indies lost all their matches except their first against India from which they collected their only point.

It is obvious that Australia so far, are the best team in the competition and their place in the finals is absolutely certain. At the moment India appear to be safe in second position and look poised to make it to the best-of-three final round against Australia. But cricket is a funny game and nothing can be ruled out. Who knows that the West Indians are not going to win all their four matches in the second half of the tournament? If they win one of their two matches against Australia and win both their matches against India they will be in the reckoning for the finals. provided India get beaten by the Aussies. All these are within the realms of possibil-

matches in the tournament to date if appears fairly clear that the task ahead of the West Indians indeed an uphill one. Their performance in the four matches left a lot to be destred. Their batsmen have not really scored enough runs in any of the games. In their first match against India they failed to reach the modest target of 127 and tied the match, hav-



RICHARDSON...no runs ing lost all the wickets for 126. The good work of the bowlers could not be upon. In their second match against Australia, the target was again not that big (only 174 in 50 overs), but again their batsmen failed and thanks to three run outs they fell short by nine runs. In their match, against india, the batsmen fared little better; chasing India's total of 262 they were all out for 252. In the fourth match, against Australia, the Caribbean batsmen found the Australian total of 234 too big and could go up to only 183.

In the first two matches the But from the run of the West indian bowlers did well

to restrict the Indians to 126 and the Australians to 173. But the batsmen could hardly measure up to the Indian and Australian attacks. Only Desmond Haynes lived up to his reputation with scores of 0,62, 89 and 9, averaging 40. Their greatest disappointment has been their skipper

Richie Richardson. He celebrated is nomination as skipper at Sharjah with a tally of 272 at an average of 90-66; but he feded out since then, a tally of 21 in three matches in Pakistan and 30 in four matches in the present tournament are definitely very unlike Richardson. His bad-patch has continued in the matches following the first half of the World Series. Other upper-order batsmen-Aphilo Wallace, Carl Hooper, Brian Lara and Keith Arthurton- have not really flourished in the tournament so far. But one good thing about them is that they have managed to win all their matches in the intervening period and some of the batsmen- Carl Hooper and Kaith Arthurton in particular are amongst the runs. They would very much hope for better and

consistent performances from their batsmen. Specially from their skipper, whose lean run is bound to end. A butsmun of his quality and experience cannot be in the dumps for too long. The four quick bowlers are

as good as any other. Hooper and Arthurton are expected to offer effective support. I have a hunch the Caribbeans are not really going to take it lying low. They will be up and about and if they can match up their determination with their potential and promise, something spectacular may not be a daydream. But since the new team is in the process of rebuilding,

the task ahead of them may prove too big. It was very commendable

on the part of the Indians that they could snatch a point from the West Indies, despite being booked for 126. In their second match they beat the favourites convincingly by a margin of 107 runs. The Aussies were all out for 101 Ravi Shastri being the Wreeker with 5 for 15. However, they were beaten equally convincingly by the Aussics in the next two matches; David Boon, registering the only ton of the tournament so far, helped his side to surpass the Indian total of 175 for the loss of only two wickets in the second match. India were outplayed in the third match, in which they could manage only 157 and Australia raced to victory losing four wickets, thanks to Allan Border's 76 and Dean Jones' unbeaten 63. The West Indies were 'Srikkanthed' in their second encounter with India, while the Australians were meted out the same treatment in their first encounter.

The indian batting has not been consistent. In the two matches where Srikkanth got into his stride and did what he usually does, for which Allan Border has coined the word' Srikkanthed' the Indian totals went beyond 200 and proved to be winning totals. India would only hope Srikkanth does it every now and then and not once in a

After the just-concluded third Test match the Indians are expected to be in better shape, their morale rejuvenated and confidence retrieved Ravi Shastri, after his double century and 4 for 45, is likely to be his real self in the forthcoming matches in the

role of a genuine all-rounder. Sachin Tendulkar must have found his rhythm, hitting a superb century. The best of Sanjay Manjrekar is yet to come. Like the West Indians. the Indians would also wish their skipper Mahammad Azharuddin to come out of his bad-patch. The third Test rejuvenation may work as an inspirational source for the

not be among the surprised. Contrary to all speculation Indian bowling has proved to be quite effective. Kapil Dev. Money Prabhakar and Subrata Banerji have made most of the swinging condition. Javagal Srinath, initially ridiculed by the Aussies as all arms and legs', has already proved that those arms do not lock to strength and with brisk movements of his legs he is capable of generating lot of

If India makes it to the finals, which is very likely Australia may not find them to

be an easy prey. The Australians, without the services of their main bowler Bruce Reid due to injury, may find it difficult to contain and run through the Indian batting line up. Ofcourse, Australia have a very balanced team; their batting has depth and fluency, their bowling has penetrative power and above all their fielding easily scores an edge over others. Geoff Marsh, David Boon, Dean Jones, Tom Moody, Allen Border and the Waugh twins Mark and Steve form a formidable line-up. The attack would now rest on the shoulders of Craig Mcdermott, Mike Whitney, Simon O' Donell (if fit), the Waugh brothers, Tom Moody and Peter Taylor, almost all the Australian players are in good form. So the Australians are legitimately considered to be the top favourites for the World Series

In the absence of Reid the Indians may feel themselves a little relaxed, but one hopes they are not too relaxed. The Austrians were found to fatter under pressure in the Sydney Test and this thought is going to be an encouraging factor for the Indians.

One day cricket is essentially a batsmen's game and the bowlers' role is primarily one of containment. Good line and length are more vital than pace and bounce. Above all, the performance on the day decides the issue. The favourite host side, enjoying home ground advantages, would do well to guard against complacency. The Indians, with confidence retrieved and the problem of adjustment overcome to a great extent, cannot really be discounted. Who knows if the Australians are not due for a great surprise?
