

The Law Ministry will soon forward the draft to the cabinet division of the government. If the cabinet okays the draft, it will be placed in Parliament by the relevant ministry for Election Commission (EC) approval, the sources added.

The Election Commission recently proposed the law to hasten the procedure of trial of 'election offenders', the sources added.

'summary trial' would provide punishment to the offenders as per the existing penal code, but faster.

The proposal for 'summary trial' is one of the special steps the Election Commission has taken so far to stop election offences including corrupt or illegal practices, bribery, impersonation and undue influence in the coming Union Parishad (UP) elections January 22.

The EC is also actively considering making the existing penalties for offences in the polls more severe, officials said explaining that the term of

imprisonment might be extended and the amount in fines increased.

In a departure from the previous system the UP elections have been spread over 14 days instead of being held in a single day to control law and order. Over 500 people were killed in the last violenceplagued UP polls held in 1988.

This year's schedule provides the holding of the polls in a single upazila under one district in a single day so that the total strength of law enforcing personnel may be used more effectively.

90 pc of export stabilisation fund remains unutilised

About 90 per cent of the Export Stabilisation Fund (Stabex) provided by the European Economic Community (EEC) remains unutilised because of the lack of proper project formulation, sources

The EEC has been providing the fund as compensation for the losses in export earnings in the jute and tea sectors since 1986. The fund was originally formulated for the Arabian, Caribbean and Pacific countries. However, Bangladesh persuaded the EEC to include it in the list.

Heads of the Israeli, peace negotiating teams are due to meet tomorrow (Monday) morning in an effort to resolve a procedural dispute which obstructed the previous round of Middle East peace talks, reports Reuter.

Arab officials told Reuters on Saturday that Jordanian, Palestinian, Lebanese and Syrian delegates agreed in a meeting on Friday night to push the Washington talks to Monday rather than Sunday, the date favoured by Israel.

They did not give a reason for wanting a later date and said Palestinian members of the joint Palestinian-Jordanian delegation still insisted on meeting separately with the Israeli side.

The talks was adjourned on December 18 without resolving the Palestinian request. But

the issue could be cleared, Palestinian and Jordanian opening the door to talks aimed at agreeing on self-rule for 1.75 million Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip by November.

The Israeli delegation handed the Jordanian-Palestinian side a proposal to hold a general meeting tomorrow (Monday) but the Arab side responded with a request to attempt to resolve the dispute in talks at the state department between the heads of the delegations.

"If the heads of the teams resolve the issue, the delegates will join the talks - nothing has been resolved so far in separating the two delegations, "Jordanian spokesman Marawan Mouasher said. But Chief Israeli negotiator
