The allegation, raised by opposition Awami League MP Tofael Ahmed (AL), was also supported by Ansar Ali Siddiqi and Fatema Chowdhury of the Treasury Bench who said they were ignored in the project implementation process in their constituencies.

The opposition members said ministers were interfering in sanctioning wheat for the food for work programme ignoring the local MPs - thus undermining their privileges. They alleged that the ministers were trying to politicise the administration.


The Speaker assured the members that if the allegations are found adequately supported by proofs and documents, he would certainly refer it to the Special Privilege Committee for solution.



The process of denationalisation will be expedited next month despite opposition from the labour front, Industries Minister informed the Industrial Development Council meeting in Dhaka Tuesday. reports UNB.

Minister Shamsul Islam Khan said 40 industrial units have been listed for denationalisation. The process will start on approval by NEC (National Economic Council) of the recommendations of the Committee for Denationalisation.

Of the 40 units, 26 will be sold to the highest bidders while 100 per cent shares of 8 units and 49 per cent shares of the rest 6 will be sold to the members of the public.

The 37 member council met for the first time at BCIC Bhavan since it was set up by

11 medical teachers ordered out of capital in one day

Eleven senior teachers of different medical colleges and institutes have been transferred to Mymensingh. They have been asked to join within 24 hours, violation of which would entail punitive action.

A Health Ministry directive dated January 13 ordered the transfer of the 11 teachers, from various institutions in the capital, to the Mymensingh Medical College and asked them to join by Tuesday after-

The directive, by presidential order, cautioned that those who would fail to meet the joining deadline would be given a stand-release order. The teachers transferred

from Dhaka Medical College. Str Saltmullah Medical College (SSMC), IPGM&R, NIPSOM National Institute of Ophthalmology and the Centre for Medical Education include two professors, four associate professors, four assistant professors and a lecturer. Speaking on condition of

anonymity, a teacher transferred is Mymensingh said the order was conveyed to him over telephone by Health Ministry officials on Monday. "I received the letter Tuesday noon which asked me to join by the same afternoon." Another recipient of the

letter of the transfer order told The Daily Star that he could not join his new place of work because of such a short notice. Besides, he also took exceptions to the nature and the tone of the directive.

Meanwhile, SSMC authorities. Tuesday postponed its scheduled third professional MBBS Pathology examination today because of the surprise order.

The order virtually left no senior teachers in the Pathology Department of SSMC. The college authorities, when contacted, said it was impossible to conduct the examinations without the teachers who had taught the course.

Our SSMC Correspondent adds: On hearing the news of postponement, the examinees staged demonstration before the college authorities. They demanded prompt holding of examination.
