Myanmar attack on BDR post bid to divert world attention

COX'S BAZAR, Jan 18: A dissident Myanmar student leader said that the December 21 attack on the BDR outpost was made to divert world attention from the armed resistance to the ruling military junta continuing inside Myan-

In an exclusive interview with The Daily Star Friday. Mrat Kyaw, General Secretary of the Arakan Unit of the All Burma Students Democratic Front (ABSDF), said that the Lunthin border guards attacked the Rejupara BDR post

December 21 in an effort to divert attention from its desperate internal situation.

The attack was also a trick to create pressure on world conscience to sympathise the ongoing quest for democracy in Myanmar, he said.


