
Seles retains her Aussie Open title



a warning: improve or face losing the top spot, reports AP. Top-seeded Seles was as dominating as usual Saturday in successfully defending her Australian Open titles, her two-fisted groundstrokes pounding No 7 Mary Joe Fernandez into submission 6-2, 6-3 to earn the 270,000 US

dollars first price. No 1 Stefan Edberg meets No 2 Jim Courier in the men's final Sunday.

Fernandez showed only flashes of the sharp net game she unveiled in ousting No 3 Gabriela Sabatini in the semifi-

But she said she knows she must continue the switch to a more aggressive style, and that it's a lesson Seles should learn if she wants to add to her collection of five Grand Slams.

"I think when you're No 1 and you win all the time, it's hard to change," Fernandez said. "I think that's a mistake. Someone is going to come along who is going to beat her. She's not improving. When I did attack. I won most of the points."

Although the 20-year-old said Seles already is beatable now. "You have to play a perfect match. she creates shots from nowhere. But eventually someone is going to catch up to her."

Seles, 18, agreed that she must improve, particularly if she wants to conquer the speed of grass courts and win the only Grand Slam she hasn't claimed yet — Wimbledon.

"I would really like to have the serve stronger, just come in more often. I think for Wimbledon, I'm going to have to," she said. "That's going to be hard, because I don't feel secure."


Seles won all three Grand Slams she contested last year but pulled out of Wimbledon. citing injury. she has reached the finals of 19 consecutive tournaments, winning 13.

Fernandez said Seles' big advantage is mental.

"I think the best part of her game is her tenacity." Fernandez said. "I think that's what wins her most of her matches."

Seles looked coquettish at her post-match news conference in a pink, crushed silkand-lace floppy hat and calflength sundress reminiscent of the 1920s style of the woman she most admires in tennis.

Stiffer fines for 'Seles syndrome'

MELBOURNE, Jan 25: The Monica Seles fine" is now in

Seles sparked a controversy by skipping a tournament last year to play an exhibition. That sort of action will be five times more costly this year, following adoption of an increased rate of fines Saturday by the Women's International Pro Tennis Council, reports AP.

Effective this year, a player in violation of the exhibition rule will be automatically fined in accordance with the following schedule:

Those ranked No 1 to No 4. 100,000 dollars; No 5-No 8. 50,000 dollars: No 9-No 20, 25,000 dollars; and No 21-No 50. 12.500 dollars .

"The members of the Women's Pro Council anticipate that these new fine levels will deter promoters from staging exhibitions which negatively impact the women's professional circuit," said Anne Person, the council's managing

director. "ideally, these increased fines will not need to be imposed, but the WIPTC felt that it was important to take a stronger initiative in protecting Kraft Tour tournaments from til-timed exhibitions."

She said there are more than 20 exhibitions scheduled

"We're not trying to prevent players from participating in exhibitions, we're just trying to regulate the timing and location," she said. Seles was fined 20,000 dol-

lars for playing an exhibition instead of a tournament in Brighton, England, even though she hadn't entered the Brighton event. Steffi Graf and respectively. other players complained that the fine wasn't enough.

The council is the governing body that administers the tour. It is a non-profit group. comprised of voting members representing the players of the Women's Tennis Association, the International Tennis Federation, and the tournaments.


