LONDON, Jan 27: Some 200,000 supporters of ousted Georgian President Zviad Gamsakhurdia surrounded the government building in Tbilisi Sunday night, a television report monitored by the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) said, reports AFP.

Tengiz Sigua, the head of the military council that forced Gamsakhurdia to flee, was among those trapped inside, Moscow's channel I said.

The demonstration started after a statement by Gamsakhurdia urging his supporters to overthrow the council was distributed.

CIS combat troops to leave Poland by Nov

WARSAW, Jan 27: Combat troops of the Commonwealth of Independent States will leave Poland by mid-November and non combat troops will all have left by 1994, a CIS general announced yesterday, according to the Polish news agency PAP, reports AFP.

General Victor Dubinin, commander-in-chief of CIS troops in Poland, said the agreed timetable for the withdrawal of the troops and their families, estimated at 100,000 would be respected.

Speaking at a news conference at Legnica, southwest Poland, Dubinin said combat until would quit Poland by November 15, 1992.

The Tass news agency in Moscow said 23,000 officers and soldiers, 400 tanks and 200 armored personnel carriers had already left Poland since the start of the withdrawal in early 1989.

Rebels kill 7 troops in Colombia: Colombian guerillas killed 11 soldiers and wounded seven in

two ambushes less than a week before the rebels are due to restart peace talks with the government, the army said on Sunday, reports Reuter from Bogota, Colombo.

The attacks, the most serious against the security forces this year, coincided with a radio report that one guerillas movement will send two senior commanders to the new round of negotiations with the government.

In the most serious attack, Marxist Querillas ambushed soldiers patrolling near the oil industry center of Casabe, 250 km north of Bogota on Sunday, killing seven soldiers and wounding five.

In an attack on Saturday afternoon, rebels ambushed an army convoy near the Andean town of Valdivia, 300 km northwest of the capital, in which four soldiers were killed, two were injured.

281 detainees freed in Jammu: The Jammu and Kashmir government Monday released 281 Kashmiri detainees who were arrested in connection with subversive activities, PTI says from Jammu.

The release was ordered on the occasion of the 43rd Republic Day after the screening committee reviewed their cases, an official spokesman said here.

This is the biggest ever number of detainces released in the state in the last two years, he said.

Chinese N-scientist missing: A Chinese nuclear scientist vanished in the mountains of southwest China three months ago, and authorities have failed to uncover any clues about his disappearance, an officials newspaper reported Monday, AP from Betting says.

Hua Tlangiang, a senior engineer at the Shanghai Nuclear Institute of the Chinese Academy of Sciences, was last seen on October 15 in Sichuan province's Emei Mountain, one of China's holy mountains and a popular tourist site, the China Daily reported.

The New York Times said Hua was director of the institute's intelligence unit and that he had access to a wide range of secrets about sensitive projects in China's nuclear pro-gramme. It said Hua's prolonged disappearance had raised suspicion that he was either dead or had been smuggled abroad by a foreign intelligence service.

The China Daily report said authorities had ruled out homicide because their exhaustive searches have uncovered no signs of foul play. The paper did not suggest that Hua had been kidnapped abroad.

Levy heads Israeli team in Moscow: Foreign Minister David Levy became the highest-ranking Israeli government member to visit Moscow when he arrived on Sunday to head Israel's delegation to Middle East peace

talks, reports Reuter from Moscow. "We have come here with great hope and faith all the sides are interested in promoting peace," Levy said after arriving on an Israelt plane from Betting, where he established diplomatic ties with China

The Soviet Union last October restored relations it severed with Israel over the 1967 Middle East war.

Clashes leave 4 dead in Lebanon: One Israeli soldier and three pro-Iranian guerillas were killed

on Sunday in one of the worst clashes between the two adversaries in South Lebanon this year, Reuter reports from Haris, Lebanon. A dawn ambush of an Israeli patrol driving through the

Shrite Muslim village of Sribbine inside Israel's self-declared security zone triggered a seven-hour battle with Islamic resistance guerillas, security sources said.

The attackers exchanged machine-gun fire and shouldermounted grenades with the Israeli soldiers.

Curfew in Mauritanian towns: Mauritania's two main towns were under overnight curfew Monday amid opposition claims that police killed up to five

people demonstrating against disputed presidential elections, Reuter reports from Nouakchott. State radio announced a curiew from 7 pm to 6 am (1900 to 0600 gmt) in the capital Nouakchott and main port of Nouadhibou, starting on Sunday night and due again on

Monday. It gave no explanation. Various opposition sources said two to five people were killed in Nouadhibou on Sunday in clashes with police. It was

not immediately possible to verify the claims. Friday's polling was chaotic in many districts. The opposi-tion accused Taya of massive fraud and some western diplomats said they were sure there was cheating.

EC urges ASEAN to help restore human rights in Myanmar

television. One fighter killed in the counter strikes reportedly carried a document identifying him as a French citizen. The TV report quoted a spokesmen for the Azerbaijan People's Front saying the man was a mercenary

Her husband said Kremer was not authorized to say one word' to the media and had made statements that were 'totally false'. He declined to identify or correct any specific statements he contends are false.


Dapper President, better model

Arrests aimed at leading people, army into war: FIS

ALGIERS, Jan 27: Muslim fundamentalists, waging a war of words Sunday against Algeria's military-backed rulers, said the arrest of their leaders was aimed at leading the people and the army into

war, reports AP. The Islamic Salvation Front warned such practices 'will spare neither blood, nor

honor, nor possessions." In the statement dated Saturday but made public Sunday, the movement said the electoral process, abruptly cancelled earlier this month, should continue and the front's imprisoned officials be set

The Salvation Front's acting leader, Abdelkader Hachant, was arrested Wednesday for allegedly calling on the army to desert.

Fundamentalist sources said Hachani was transferred to Algiers' Serkadji prison on Sunday. The information was not officially confirmed. The exact charges against him

were not immediately known. Numerous other fundamentalists also have been arrested since the High State Committee came to power on January 16 the same day second-round parliamentary elections were to be held.

The Salvation Front, which

wants to install an Islamic State, swept the December 26 first-round vote. Its near-certain parliamentary victory was thwarted by a series of maneuvers which resulted in the resignation of President Chadli Bendjedid and brought in the five-member High State

The Salvation Front said the series of arrests 'are aimed at leading the people and the national Popular Army into

The Salvation Front has made increasing references to the army to its official statements as their standoff with the new rulers continues.

The movement's operations were radically weakened by orders last week to enforce a law against political discourses at mosques and banning gatherings outside mosques.

The new orders were enforced at Friday prayers by a massive deployment of soldiers and security forces, and warning shots were fired in two districts to disperse tense

Authorities also have targeted some journalists in their bid to crush the fundamentalist voice, arresting five editors from two Arab-language news papers, one controlled by the Salvation Front. They were ar-

rested Saturday for publishing the communique for which Hachani was arrested, a "call to rebellion and disobedience," authorities said.

Numerous foreign reporters have been briefly held for questioning. At least four Spanish journalists were expelled, according to the independent newspaper El Watar.

The standoff between fundamentalists and authorities has overshadowed a duel within the former ruling party. the National Liberation Front, which controlled the nation since independence from France in 1962.

Party infighting, always rampant, reached a peak with Secretary General Abdelhamid Nerhi's denunciation of the High State Committee as unconstitutional, and a meeting of some party officials with the Salvation Front.

The National Liberation Front's Central Committee was meeting in an extraordinary session over the weekend in an effort to find a single voice.

But newspapers said the Front, which placed a poor third in the parliamentary elections, was in the midst of an

"implosion."
