first American in 6 1/2 years to be ranked the No 1 tennis player in the world if he reaches the final of the Volvo San Francisco next week. He is currently ranked second behind Stefan Edberg of Sweden.

"Tennis is not about rankings, it's about titles." Courier said Thursday in a conference call. "That's what is important to me. I much prefer my French and Australian titles to being N 2 in the world because the computer can be partial.

"Stefan or Boris (Becker) could play 30 tournaments and I play 15, and although I have a better record, they play more tournaments and will be ranked higher. Winning tournaments isn't like that. If you won the tournament, you won the tournament."



Courier will play tournaments at San Francisco. Brussels and Stuttgart in the next month. He only has to improve upon disappointing 1991 results at Memphis and Philadelphia to increase his lead over Edberg.

Edberg won at Brussels and

Stuttgart in 1991, but is scheduled to skip Brussels this year before playing at Stuttgart. "If you get (to No 1) to stay there, you can't think about it," Courier said. "If you do, it's more taxing, I don't think anybody who has been up there... you have to keep winning.

That's what you have to con-

centrate on... If you don't have points on the computer, You have nothing to defend."

Courier vaulted up the tennis ladder in 1991, jumping from No 25 to No 2 by winning tournaments at Indian Wells. Calif., and Key Biscayne, Fla., before winning his first Grand Slam title at the French Open. He also was runner-up at the 1991 US Open.





### World Series Cup: Aussies were far superior A M Chowdhury



The Australians maintained their supremacy by lifting

Benson & Hedges World Series Cup with ease, the Indians failing to stretch them to the third encounter of the finals. That they were very near to doing that speaks of India's determination to fight it out to the last, and the margin of only six runs does a lot of honour for the vanguished.

The Indians were defeated in the second final, but definitely not outplayed as they were in the first, in which they crumbled for 145 with three overs to spare and 89 runs short of the target. After being 72 for 1 India slumped to 84 for 4: the batsmen following were somewhat paniestricken.

In ten matches during this triangular tournament Australia lost only two - one each against India and West Indies - and in the only match that was washed away by rain they faced a modest West Indian total of 160. India, on the other hand, won only three matches ione against Australia and two against West Indies), tied match against the West Indies and lost six (five against Australia and one against the West Indies). The West Indies, third among three, lost four (two each against both the opponents), tied one with India and split points with the 5 for 15 at the WACA ground. Australians in the only rain in- Perth. David Boon was their terrupted match. They won highest run-getter: 432 in 9 only two games, one each opponents.

Alian Border played the matches with extreme professtonalism and their superiority in all the departments of the game was clearly manifest: of course, in fielding they were superb and their opponents were nowhere near them. They effected 17 run outs in ten matches, whereas India could manage only 7 in ten. and the West Indians hit the stumps in time only on 6 occasions in 7 matches (in one match rain did not allow them to have a go at the Australians).

If we look at it from another angle, the picture will be clearer. The Australian batsmen were run out only 6 times in 9 matches (twice against India and 4 times against the Windies), Indian batsmen were run out 13 times [11 times against Australia and twice against West Indies) while the West Indian batsmen were run out 11 times (6 times against Australia and 5 times against India). That means Indian batsmen were definitely not running well under the pressure of tight Australian field ing. That also proves the agility of the Australian batsmen in taking their runs; they were running twos while others hesitated in taking a single. When big hitting is not possible runs have to be accumulated in singles and twos and this the Australians did with amazing ease; the sluggishness in the fielding of their opponents made their task less risky. The Australians were toweringly above their opponents in running between the wickets and in their alertness on the field.

Steve Waugh proved useful with the ball and his figures of 16 wickets at an average of 19 runs (3.78 per over) are impressive. His 60 runs in 7 outings at an average of 12.00 should not be taken at their face value. He usually appeared on the scene when only a few overs remained.

Mike Whitney, playing in 8 matches, bagged 9 wickets at an average of 25.55, but conceded only 2.94 runs per over. The figures of the pace bowlers do clearly tell the story that they were right on the target and very few batsmen could take liberty with them. Only Peter Taylor, the spinner used regularly, was taken advantage of; his each over cost him 4.26 and each wicket (total bag of 10) 35.30. The key to Australian success was the accuracy of their pacemen. The fluent batting of the upper order batsmen provided the right back-up. In only one match, against

Shastri's spin at Perth, they looked like being in trouble. Individual performances of the Indians come fairly close to those of the Australians. Sachin Tendulkar, the teenage batting sensation, totalled 401 with four 50s averaging 44.55. Only David Boon had a better record in the tournament. He was too good for his age, learnt quickly to cut down his lofty shots, and batted with flourish and assurance. He was the only Indian batsman who faced the bowling with ease and once settled, looked like establishing the supremacy of the willow over the leather. He clearly demonstrated that he is the one to be feared and respected by the opposing bowlers and cheered by the crowd even in enemy territory. In the second final he stood between the Australians and victory and had Azharuddin not played that indiscreet shot off Border and

stayed a little longer, it was

not an impossibility that the Australians could have been stretched to the third decider. Krish Srikkanth's tally of 313 (averaging 31.30) with

three 50s justified his inclu-

sion in the team. He was not as sharp as he used to be, but the day he came to be his own self India looked like winning and actually did win on three occasions when he scored 60, 82 and 60. His other two scores of 42 and 41 against Australia went in vain. Sanjay Manjrekar scored two 50s in the third and fourth match, but later withered away and his tally of 188 (average 18.80) does not really do justice to his potentials. Other batsmen per formed moderately: Ravi Shastri scored 159 (av. 17.66). Kapil Dev 151 (av. 25.16) and Amre 131 (av. 18.71). India's greatest disappointment was their skipper Muhammad Azharuddin, who totalled only 136 at an average of 15.11. India had a right to expect something better than that from one of her leading bats-

Contrary to all speculations, Indian bowlers performed reasonably well. Manot Prabhakar was impressive with 12 wickets at an average of 26.25 conceding 3.66 runs per over Javagal Srinath, in his maiden tour, did bowl quite well and his 11 wickets cost him 28.09 aptece and gave away 3.86 per over. Kapil Dev bagged 9 wickets at 30.55 apiece and his dispensation per over was 3.52. But the figures do not really reflect the quality of the bowling of the highest wicket taker in one-day cricket (to date his tally stands at 217). his first spell in almost all the matches was a superb demonstration of controlled swing bowling. Venkatpathy Raju played only four matches and bowled quite well to capture 6 wickets at 23.92 apiece giving away 3.83 per over, a very good performance for a spinner in one-dayers. Ravi Shastri's initial success (5 for 15) did not continue and his 8 wickets cost him 31.87 apiece and he conceded 3.93 runs per over. That Sachin Tendulkar had to be often used as a bowler is a proof of the lack of depth in

the Indian bowling. He was

ealled in to bowl in 9 matches and in one he did bowl the full quota of 10 overs conceding

38 runs. Indian batsmen did not avail themselves of all the opportunities of taking singles and of ten took only one when two could be taken. Their poor running between the wickets cost them quite a few runs in every match and these few proved to be vital. They came

so near yet too far in the second final The West Indian team, being in the process of rebuild ing, was not really expected to be in the finals. A solitary point in their bag in the first leg of the tournament was demoralising. That they could shed off all initial inhibition and could win two matches, one each against India and Australia, was highly creditable. The coming back to form of their skipper Richie Richardson greatly contributed to their change of fortunes. They were edged out by

The West Indian bowling was throughout good and accurate. Curtley Ambrose was the most economical bowler of the tournament. He conceded only 2.85 runs per over and his 9 wickets cost him 21.77 aptece. Malcolm Marshall took wickets at an average of 30.12 and Anderson Cummins took 10 wickets at 27.70 per wicket; while the former gave away 3.54 runs per over and the latter 4.04. Hooper's 7 wickets cost him 252 runs (av. 36.00) and his per over dispensation was 3.70. These figures compare very favourably with those of the Indian and

the Indians in the last match.

Australian bowlers. However, the West Indian batting did not produce the expected runs. Desmond Haynes, the top batsman in one-day cricket with little over 7000 runs to his credit, could compile only 293 runs with four 50s at an average of 36.62; Richie Richardson came second with 185 with two 50s averaging 23.12. Brian Lara, Carl Hooper or Keith Arthurton played one or two good innings here and there, but lacked consistency. It was obvious from the tournament that their batting needs to be improved; some solidity has to be imparted to the middle order. Of

the three teams they seemed to have had a longer tail, which rarely wagged.

The triangular tournament did provide lots of thrill and the second final carried the thrills to a nail-biting stage and the Indians came tantalisingly close. For the first time in the tournament Border & Co looked like nervous. When Sachin Tendulkar and Praveen Amre were pushing the score at a good pace and India was approaching her goal, the pressure on the fielders resulted in a few overthrows and missed catches. But once they got rid of the 'little master' (a title which for long was ad duced to another great batsman of this subcontinent, Hantf Mohammad, and I beg to be forgiven by the readers for using the same title for this Indian batting genius, who is going to be the batsman of the current decade) they looked like getting back their compo-

The Indians were beaten. but cannot be said have been humiliated. They can take comfort from the performances of a few and would obviously hope for better performance from others. The most miserable man at the moment is their captain Muhammad Azharuddin, whose highest score in the ten match series was 31 and in every outing he put up an air of haste, which is clearly indicative of nervous condition, which in turn caused further panic in the team resulting in a number of run outs in which he himself was involved. He is really undergoing a long nasty patch and ericket-lovers would wish him all luck so that he can settle down to a relaxed mood with a confidence-retrieving

score in the coming two Tests. Whether the tour schedule of staging one day matches interspersed by Test matches did any good to the tourists or caused distress for them is a moot point. Test matches and one-day games are different brand of cricket. Not that every one can adjust to the changed atmosphere with ease. Would the result have been different had the onedayers been played in one go either before or after the five Tests? Keep on thinking.
