February 21, an Identity Solution

"The language movement gave us a national identity", said Igbal Ansari Khan. Now a prominent advocate and politician, he was involved in the language movement and the Liberation War of 1971. He said that language itself was a political issue and not an end in itself. He is the son of Ali Amjad Khan, an eminent politician, lawyer and Member of Pakistan National Assembly (1964), and Begum Anwara Khatun, who was one of the earliest Muslim women to receive LLB degrees, became the first Muslim lady member of Bengal Legislative Assembly in 1946 and re-elected in 1952. As a result Iqbal Ansari had access to some of the most important political figures and exposed to their views and optnions. The general impression nowadays is that the movement meant to make Bangla as the 'only' state language of Pakistan. Mr. Khan said. This is far from the actual state of

affairs. I regularly wrote posters during this time. Recalling. I can categorically jot down that the first series of posters 1 wrote carried chants like

"Urdu-Bangla Bhai Bhai

Rashtra Bhasha Dui-e-Chai", which meant that we wanted both Urdu and Bangla as state languages. If the minority West Pakistani wanted to impose their will. the East Pakistants behaved like a responsible majority. in not trying to impose their will on the West Pakistanis merely because they were minorities. This could be clearly located. even at much later a time. In 1954.

when the Twenty-One-Points Joint-Front election Charter was given, the very first point in the charter was that Bangla should be made one of the state languages of Pakistan. In fact it was basically a fight of rights between East and West Pakistants and, when the language issue appeared, it was grabbed with all ferocity and proved to be impregnate with all kinds of history-making chemistry.

During 1948-49 Mr. Khan was general secretary of the student's union of Jagannath College. After a demonstration in front of East Pakistan assembly in the presence of Chief Minister Nazimuddin, he was arrested along with three others. He was again taken to jail in 1952 along with five others for violation of Section 144, which prohibited public meetings of more than five people and demonstrations.

To an ardent observer, what language movement would offer, was not only the craving for making Bangla as the State language of Pakistan (Bangla, till 1953 was the mother tongue of 66 per cent of the population), but a very much relegated to the subaltern spot."

movement for democracy and fundamental rights. Language was an issue: it could as well be any other issues for a democratic move ment. Had Jinnah said, instead of language. that no one from East Pakistan would be taken in Pak military or no industry would be developed by Bengalis in East Pakistan, I am certain, instead of writing the posters I wrote for the State language movement. I would have switched over to write on the military, or industrial issues. and then going to jail for what ever issue would have been as painful and as glorious", Igbal Ansart Khan expressed strong-

Jinnah's first very visit to Dhaka, as the Governor-General of Pakistan in 1948, sparked so much heat, that it twisted, turned and twirled not only the face of Pakistan, but changed the whole gamut of India Pakistan Bangladesh his-

> tory. Although Jinnah had announced in 1948 about Urdu being Pakistan's state language, he never pressed the matter or implement his declaration.

In addressing a mammoth public rally at the Dhaka Gymkhana Race Course (now Suhrawardy Uddyan) Jinnah made a fate ful declaration: *Urdu shall be the only state language of Pakistan."

lqbal Ansari Khan said, that is true. Jinnah ought to have waited and assessed public opinion before he made that controversial pronouncement. His unilateral declaration on such a vital issue as state language of Paki-

stan, it would seem, was dictatorial in manifes-

Mr. Khan concluded, 'the underlying essence of the language movement was the element of domination of the majority East Pakistanis by the minority West Pakistanis. From the very beginning of the creation of Pakistan, this feeling proved rather penchant and swaggering. The first indication of this was the making of Karachi as the Capital of Pakistan. For the majority Pakistanis dwelling in East Pakistan. it proved to be a cruel blow. As a result, the rich and intellectual Indian Muslims migrating to Pakistan went straight to Karachi and began to invest cash and efficiency for business and other activities there. Being the seat of the Central government, naturally, all the booty and favours went to the people of Karachi and its adjacent areas. East Pakistan separated by over one thousand miles of Indian territory, was

Theft poses threat to power supply

Power supply in the country is facing serious problems of transmission and distribution on account of frequent thefts of equipment, wire and accessortes, reports UNB.

Official sources said seven transformers, transformer of and 10,000 feet of electric wire worth about Tk 30 lakh had been stolen at Narati, Kalta and Magura areas of Jessore district alone during the first week of this month. A tower of Ashuganj

Ghorashal-Siddhirgani 132 KV

line at Jagannathpur near Bhairab collapsed and two others were damaged by a light storm in August last year as 50 bracings of the tower had been stolen earlier. The loss has been estimated at Tk 7 lakh.

Five towers of the same line worth about Tk 35 lakh also broke in April 1990 after their bracings were stolen.

Such thefts are rampant in Ashugani, Jamalpur and Ghorashal lines and about 1000 bracings from 32 towers were lost during last one and a half years, officials said.

Considering the magnitude of this problem joint interministerial action was needed to tackle it, they said.
