Rohingya refugee issue

Dhaka briefing foreign missions

Bangladesh Wednesday began a process of briefing the foreign government on the severity of the Myanmar Muslim refugees' problem as greater number of refugees are pouring into the country.

Heads of mission of about twenty countries, mostly European and that of Canada, Australia and Japan were given a graphic account of the worsening refugee problem. Foreign Office sources told

Additional Foreign Secretary Farooq Sobhan explained to the diplomats the magnitude of the refugee issue saying refugees at the rate of 500 to 1000 are crossing into Bangladesh territory.

Wednesday's briefing of the heads of mission at the Foreign Office was the first of the series that the government have planned to keep the foreign government abreast of the sit-

The process falls in line with Dhaka's latest flurry of diplomatic activities on the "Rohingya" issue.

Lack of adequate preventive measures and shortage of manpower have turned the Zia International Airport (ZIA) in Dhaka into a transit point for the international drug traffickers in recent days.

A highly-placed government official confirmed this to The Daily Star Wednesday, while referring to the recent arrest at ZIA of an American girl, who was carrying a large quantity of heroin.

"We are aware of the problem and steps are being taken to prevent drug smuggling through our airport. However, we require more manpower and adequate modern facilities to cope with the situation". said the official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Since October last year, three cases of drug trafficking through ZIA were detected in which a total of about 37 kg of heroin was seized by the au-

thorities. An American teenager Eliadah McCord was caught at ZIA Tuesday night with three kg and 300 grammes of heroin. She was due to fly for Zurich by a British Airways flight, but failed to escape the watchful eyes of the security

personnel before departure. A major incident of drug trafficking through the Dhaka airport was revealed when a Nigerian citizen was arrested at Riyadh airport with 30 kg of heroin last year.

How the alleged trafficker managed to pass through ZIA with the huge quantity of heroin is still a big mystery. The case is under investigation both at Riyadh and Dhaka, said

the sources. Experts of concerned inatrocities ternational agencies believe

that deadly drugs like heroin are being smuggled into Bangladesh from the Golden Triangle through land routes. The area called Golden Triangle, where heroin is produced, is located on the north of Burma and Thailand.

The absence of strict measures against drug trafficking at ZIA is facilitating the international gangs to smuggle drugs to other countries through this airport, said ex-"Detection of three cases of

trafficking in drugs through ZIA in five months indicates that the international gangs are active to use our airport for their heinous crime", said the official who suspects that there might have been other cases which could not be detected.

According to concerned authorities, lack of adequate number of narcotics officials and absence of modern drugdetection equipment and facilities are major obstacles to keeping proper vigil against trafficking in drugs.

Authoritative sources say that at least nine officers from Narcotics Control Department are required to be posted at ZIA to work in three shifts. But only two officers are posted there to do the job. Of the two officers, one has been assigned to do some additional duties outside the airport. So, virtually, now there is only one to look after the anti-drug operation at the international airport, the sources said.
