Clashes leave 2 killed, 120 hurt, 200 houses burnt

SIRAJGANJ, Mar 5: A fierce clash between villagers at Kalibazar near the town today left one dead and at least 100 injured, reports UNB.

Villagers alleged Yusuf (22) died when he and four others jumped from the roof of Vocational Training Institute at Ekdala into a nearby ditch.

His body could not be traced and police also didn't confirm the death.

The clash was a sequel to an incident on Tuesday last in which some unruly youngmen fought pitched battles with organisers of sports at the local Gourt Urban High School.

Another report from Pabna says: A villager was killed and 10 others were injured when a gang of dacotts opened fire at Aminpur Chakverta in Bera upazila carly today.

Akbar Ali Mandol (35) died on the spot as the gangmen shot at him while he tried to prevent the dacotty at his house at about 2 am.

Report from Jamalpur says: Ten people were injured one critically, and more than 200 houses burnt in attacks by 'lathtals' on dwellers of a char in Madarganj upazila of the district Thursday.

The FAP comprises 11 main components and 15 supporting activities to be co-ordinated by the government and the World Bank.

Work on five components of the plan, Brahmaputra river training study, cyclone protection project, Dhaka integrated lown protection project, secondary towns integrated flood protection project and Meghna left bank protection project, is

in progress. Jointly organised by the government of Bangladesh and the World Bank the briefing was also participated by Dr ATM Shamsul Huda, Chairman, Water Development Board Coordinator of FAP William T Smith, Chief Engineer of FAP MII Siddiqui and water expert Prof. Ainun Nishat.

Dr. Huda told newsmen that Dhaka integrated town protection project, funded by the ADB, was already underway and a two-year emergency cyclone protection project, supported by the European Community and Saudi fund, would be integrated into a long-term project to include the Khulna and

Chittagong regions.

In reply to question he said that all construction work of the project would be carried out by the Water Development

Dr Iluda further said that the problem of riverbank protection for Jamalpur, lying between Jamuna and Brahmaputra, was being handled under a FAP priority programme which should be completed by next year.

He said that bank protect tion test works being carried out by German, French and Dutch experts were directed towards developing new standards for the design as well as construction of protection structures.

in reply to a question the Water Board Chairman said that about 500 million US dollar would be required to implement project under FAP, which could vary with availability of results of studies.

To another questioner, he said that 'changes in the location of channels and sand banks in the Jamuna river were persistent hazards and river training works would try to make the river less fickle.

He informed that under the FAP the country would get a chance to establish the foundation for a 50-year national water resources programme.

Referring to the conference. Dr Huda said that the conference gave the government a chance to listen to the criticisms and explain the plan to funding countries and agen-

On the question of discussing water sharing problems with neighbours Dr. Huda said, 'dialogue with neighbours would continue. The National plan could be looked into in an international context, he



Repeal Indemnity Ordn: Hasina

NARAYANGANJ, Mar 5 Opposition leader Sheikh Hasina today said the Indemnity Ordinance must be rescinded to ensure rule of law and democratic order in the country, reports UNB.

"BNP had pledged to scrap the hated ordinance but, they are now dillydallying on the question.... killers must be punished to establish rule of law", she said.

Hasina, the President of the Awami League, was addressing a public meeting at Char Goaldee in Sonargaon upazila this afternoon.

The meeting was organised commemorating the death of Chhatra League leader Mizanui Rahman Mizan who was killed in an armed clash in Dhaka University on October 30,

President Zia gave legal protection to the self-confessed killers of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, through fifth amendment which "blackened the country's Constitution", she said.

The Awami League had already moved a bill in Parliament for Repealing the Ordinance, Hasina said, adding the Ordinance must be cancelled for granting security to the citizens.

Paying tributes to Mizan, Hasina lamented that Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia did not come forward to supplement her honest efforts to put an end to violence on campuses so that the students could build themselves as wor thy citizens through higher education.

At least 10 leaders and workers of Chhatra League were killed in last one year but the government did not arrest the killers nor punish them, she complained. The Opposition leader crit-

icised the BNP government for taking steps to fulfil its election commitment to the people. There has been no policy to salvage the fledgling economy, provide job to unemployed and increase industrial and agricultural production.

The prices of essential commodities has been soaring but the income of the commonman has not increased in proportion. Democracy will be meaningless without economic emancipation, she said

Referating Awami League's programme, she said her party had been struggling to establish an exploitation free society and a self-reliant economy.

Presided over by local party leader Abdus Sattar, the meeting was addressed among others by Mizan's father Nurul Islam and Chhatra League leaders Habibur Rahman Habib, Shah Alam, Ashim Kumar Ukil, Golam Mostala Sujan and Kamruzzaman Ansari.

Earlier, llasina visited the mazar of Mizan at Char Gaoldee village and offered fatcha. She also went to Mizan's House to console his parents. A heartrendering scene was created when Mizan's mother and young wife burst into tears by embracing Hastna. Hastna consoled them saying killers of Mizan must be tried.

It (the ordinance) gave protection to the confessed killers of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, which contravenes the sacred Constitution and human rights, the meeting noted. The ALWC meeting urged

the ruling BNP not to resort to any ploy and to take positive initiatives for scrapping the ordinance. "Otherwise," it warned, "the

people would have reasons to believe the killers' statement that Zia was also involved in the killing of Bangabandhu." Another resolution adopted

at the end of the ALWC meeting Wednesday said the antiterrorism bill contravenes human and fundamental rights. The sections and sub-sections proposed in the bill could be compared to martial law regulations, it said. "The bill exposes autocratic

character of the ruling party," the resolution said, adding it proves that the ruling BNP wants to nurture the autocratic rule in the country.

The resolution urged the people from all walks of life to rise in protest to force the government to withdraw the

In a separate resolution the ALWC demanded of the government to take legal action against terrorists irrespective of their political affiliations and arrest the killers of Chhatra League leader Maniruzzaman Badal after proper investiga-

The ALWC expressed grave concern at "lawlessness" which, it said, surpassed all past records. "A terrible insecurity to public life has plunged the whole nation into a state of

anarchy". It alleged that educational institutions, cities, towns and mahallas had become free zones of illegal arms holders due to "partronisation of the

ruling party." The meeting called for building mass resistance against unauthorised arms holders.

Awami League Working Committee called for greater unity of democratic forces to aressure the ruling party to shed its "caprice and undemocratic attitude and establish people's sovereignty in all spheres of national life.

The meeting adopted a set of resolutions in light of the deliberations at the party's three-day extended meeting on socio-economic and political situation existing in the country.
