Anvar convinced of issuing world call for refugees' help

Jamshed Anvar, Regional Director for Asia and Occania of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) left Dhaka Sunday for Geneva, satisfied that the UNHCR needs to issue and urgent international appeal for assistance to Myanmar refugees in Bangladesh, reports BSS.

He will report to the UNHCR headquarters in Geneva on his assessment of the worsening refugee problem stemming from unabated influx of "Rohingya" Muslims from Myanmar.

Anvar will give an account of the situation as he saw during his three-day stay in Bangladesh including a visit to the refugees in Cox's Bazar and Bandarban districts, where most of the refugees are shel-

The United Nations Secretary General Boutors Ghali is also in touch with the UNHCR headquarters in Geneva on the refugee problem in Bangladesh, diplomatic sources in Dhaka said.

Ghali has expressed his deep concern at the continued exodus of the Myanmar Muslims into Bangladesh

Anvar before his departure briefed the heads of mission and donor agencies in Bangladesh on the refugee situation and the plans the UNHCR is making to meet the situation.

He gave an account of his own experience of the condition when refugees at the rate of five to ten thousands are pouring into Bangladesh and the number has swelled to one lakh ten thousand.

It is expected that the

Jamaat getting jittery as 'trial' day nears

A sense of uneasiness is prevailing in the Jamaat camp as the day for 'public trial' of Golam Azam is approaching.

The 'National' Coordinating Committee for Implementation of the Spirit of Independence War and Annihilation of Killers and Collaborators of 1971' has planned trial of Golam Azam on March 26 in public at the Suhrawardy Udyan.

Jamaat leaders, despite continued preparations by adversaries, are yet to take any public stand on the issue. They have, however, gone for a 'quiet initiative' in the form maintaining regular contacts with the leaders of the Government, diplomatic missions based in Dhaka and advising party workers to remain against any eventuality.
