To become competitive, he said, the companies should add substantial value to their products and services through improved management and technology.

Condon added that new technologies should be applied with innovation and skill. He said Bangladeshi industries should invest with top priority in information network systems to familiarise there products in international markets. This would make their products competitive as investment in information net works ereates continual market demand. Further, such investment would also help the entrepreneurs have clear idea

about other competitors. He hoped that the Bangladeshi exporters would have good opportunity in the

single market, which will be

the world's largest and wealthicst trading bloc, if they can become competitive.

He said Bangladeshi entrepreneurs should have adequate information about their buyers and should be ready to serve them instantly. He added "strategic marketing is most needed for Bangladesh" saying that such marketing should be uniquely outward looking and to the needs of the customers. Such marketing should serve the customers in some distinctively better way than other competitors can.

Condon felt that the markets should be constantly monitored if a competitive advantage is to be created and maintained through marketing strategy.

Highlighting the main features of strategic marketing in Europe, the expert said analy-

sis of the customer, psychology, competitors' position, industry and market structure, environment, cost dynamics and capability are most essen-

He said Bangladesh must immediately know the single market customers, their fads and fancies, choices and other factors thoroughly. At the same time Bangladesh should be alert of its competitors in the EC market.

Condon stressed that Bangladesh should take steps to make its industries more efficient than the present state to make Bangladeshi products competitive in EC.

He hoped that if the above proposals could be implemented by the Bangladeshi entrepreneurs, the single EC would open up a vast market for Bangladesh, even bigger than the US market.

# Algae boom hits fish population in coast

KIIULNA, Mar 10: Fish population along the coastal belt has drastically declined to about 50 per cent of the previous year mainly due to growth of algac.

The algaeal boom has reduced oxygen content of the water and thus made the environment unfit for fish habitation.

The Deputy Director of Environment Department in Khulna region, Mosharaf Hussain recently visited the coast and found the growth of algae very alarming.

Vessel's Name

He said the heavy and frequent discharge of garbage and sewerage from the sea-going vessels in the Bay toxicates the water which helps the growth

He also said the washed off fertilizer used in agricultural land is also a reason for the alarming growth of algae.

Experts view that if the unabated growth of algae continucs, the catch of fish in the coasts would be decline and the foreign exchange carned by export of fish would also dwindle.
