Some 5,000 muster roll workers of Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) have become the victim of this month's strike and would not get their salary of striking period, a DCC source said Monday.

"As they worked under 'no work no pay basis' so it is not possible for the authorities to pay that seven days' salary," a senior official of DCC told The Daily Star.

Some 10,000 employees of DCC went on a strike on March 9 demanding implementation of national pay scale for them. Five thousand of them, mostly cleaners and squad labours, are not the permanent workers of the corporation.
