



Adelaide to host '94 C'wealth Games

ADELAIDE, Mar 30: The Australian city of Adelaide on Monday declared itself willing host the 1994 Commonwealth Games if Victoria, Canada, is unable to

do so, reports AP. International media reports during the weekend, including one in the Times of London, said Victoria still had several uncompleted sites and was facing a crisis.

Adelaide has been competing against the Malaysian capital of Kuala Lumpur for the right to host the 1998 Games, but has nearly all of its facilities already in place.

State government ministers in South Australia said Adelaide would be willing to switch its bid to 1994 if Victoria was unable to go ahead, leaving Kuala Lumpur a clear run at the 1998 nomina-

A decision on the future of the 1994 games is expected to be made at a meeting of Commonwealth delegates before the Barcelona Olympics in July.

Kym Mayes, the South Australian state Government minister for sports and recreation, said Adelaide would be able to host the Games in 1994.

"It would be very tight and we would need to cut some corners, but it can be done," Nayes said in an interview with the Associated Press.

Construction of an athletes village would be the major project, nearly all sporting facilities are already in place.

Mayes said Commonwealth Games Federation delegates already had approached Adelaide to gauge the city's ability to take over the multisport games held every four years. Commonwealth Games Federation delegates will visit Victoria in May to assess progress being made by the British Columbia city.

China's Lu Chen, a 15-yearold in her second year of senior competition, won the bronze, followed by Laetitia Hubert of France and Josee Choutnard of Canada.

For Yamaguchi, these world championships ended a perfect year. She had never won a major singles event before taking the 1991 World Championships. Then she won the US championship in January, and was the first American women's Olympic gold medalist since her idol, Dorothy Hamill, in 1976.

The 21-year-old from Fremont, Calif - who was a two time US pairs champion with Rudy Galindo before concentrating on a solo career - then capped her spectacular streak by winning her second world crown. Hamill only won the title once.

Before a sellout crowd heavily stocked with fans from her nearby hometown, Yamaguchi staged a near-duplicate of her performance at the Winter Olympics in Albertville, France. She had no trouble with her difficult triple lutz-triple toe loop combination and cleanly executed the first three minutes of her programs, to Malaguensa.

This time, she fell on a triple salchow: in the Olympics, it was on a triple loop that she went down.

That fall probably cost her any perfect 6.0 marks. But she got 115.9s and was first with

Woodbridge in a four-set doubles match Saturday, clinching an unbeatable 3-0 lead for the

It was the best showing by the Swedes in the Davis Cup since 1989, when Boris Backer led Germany to a 3-2 win in the final at Stuttgart, Germany. Sweden dominated the tournament during the 1980s, winning the trophy three times in seven final appearances, but lost first-round away matches to Italy in 1990 and Yugoslavia in 1991.

For Edberg, the weekend series proved sweet revenge after suffering two of the worst setbacks in his career earlier this year.

He lost to 238th-ranked Daniel Nestor Jan. 31 in the opening singles against Canada in the first round of the Davis Cup. Earlier this month 289thranked American Robbie Weiss upset him in the third round of the International Players Championships at Key Biscayne, Fla. Still, Edberg regained the No 1 world ranking from Jim Courier.
