Chasing a paltry target of 153, West Indies knocked off the runs with 24.1 overs to spare to register their second huge win in the space of five

best-of-three one-day

international series, reports

South Africa, looking a pale imitation of the side who reached the World Cup semifinals last month, were dismissed for 152 in 43.4 overs on a blameless pitch.

West Indies openers Desmond Haynes and Brian Lara then set about the visiting attack with relish, sending 20,000 Trinidadian spectators into raptures.

Lara cracked an unbeaten 86 and Haynes was 59 not out when the assault on South Africa's struggling attack was called off.

Unless they can improve dramatically before next week end. South Africa face considerable embarrassment in Barbados when they make their return to Test cricket after an absence of 22 years.

The tourists' limitations with both bat and ball were again alarmingly exposed after they lost the toss.

Only Jonty Rhodes with 45 vaguely threatened to put the West Indies on the defensive and extras, which numbered 27, provided the second highest total in the innings.

There were three run outs and several other batsmen fell to poor shots, beginning with captain Kepler Wessels in the third over.

ting for a world heavyweight cha-mpionship once more by winning a 10-round decis-ion over Alex Stewart on Saturday night, reports Reuter.

The difference in the close and hard-fought bout came in the second round when 43vear-old Foreman knocked Stewart down twice.

Stewart, 27, a five-to-one underdog, finished strongly, hammering the head of a slow and tiring Foreman with left jabs and combination rights.

By the end, both of Foreman's eyes were nearly closed, a cut appeared under his left eye and blood flowed freely from his nose and mouth. He breathed through his mouth in the last round and the right side of his jaw was visibly swollen.
