Libya expels diplomats from seven countries

LONDON, Apr 16: A defiant Libya has expelled diplomats from seven countries, signalling a readiness to take on the world after UN sanctions were imposed for its alleged role in airliner bombings, reports Reuter.

In its latest bout with the West over persistent charges that it aids terrorism, Libya said it was expelling diplomats from six European countries and Japan. State radio said there decision was taken within the framework of re-

Germany and Czechoslovakia — have already said they were sending some Libyan diplomats home in compliance with the UN Security Council sanctions.

The radio, in familiar anti-Western rhetoric, said the real objective of the sanctions was to make up for the failure of a US bombing raid on Tripoli six years ago.

AP from Washington says

The United States is expelling three Libyan diplomats from the United Nations and plans to maintain an economic offensive against the North African country until there is proof it does not support terrorism.

Even if Libya surrenders two suspects in the 1988 Pan Am Flight 103 bombing, the sanctions imposed by the UN Security Council at the behest of the United States and Britain will stay on, a senior State Department official said Wednesday.

"Turning over the two suspects alone will not satisfy the demands of the resolution,"

said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The deputy ambassador, a first secretary and an attache all must depart by April 25, reducing the size of the mission to nine, the official told reporters.

The United States has no relations with Libya and, consequently, there are no other Libyan diplomats in the coun-

AFP adds: The air and military embargo imposed by the United Nations Security Council on Libya may well hit that country's economy hard in the long run, as it is extremely dependent on a healthy oil sector and foreign engineers to run it, experts said. The embargo does not re-

late directly to land and maritime links and exports of Libyan oil could theoretically continue normally.

However, technical supervision should quickly deteriorate with the anticipated departure of at least part of the 1,000 to 1,500 American and British experts in the country, industrial sources say.

Libya gets more than 95 percent of its foreign exchange receipts from oil exports, with production running on the order of 1.4 million barrels a

But life appeared to go on as normal in Tripoli despite Libya's growing isolation. Traffic was normal. A few cars still displayed black ribbons on radio antennas, left over from a nationwide protest Tuesday over US air raids on Libya six years ago, but the black mourning clothes were gone.

There are 1 million foreigners in the nation of 4.2 million people, but many said they felt no fear over the international confrontation and did not plan to flee.

HC asks govt not to deport Azam until hearing ends

A High Court division bench Thursday passed an ad-interim order asking the government not to deport Golam Azam from Bangladesh until the hearing of the rule in connection with his detention issued on March 30.

The bench comprised Justice Mohammad Ismail Uddin Sarker and Justice

Badrul Islam Chowdhury. The government was given three weeks time on March 30 to show cause why the detention order against Azam

should not be declared illegal. Earlier, on Wednesday, a petition was filed on behalf of Golam Azam seeking court or-

der barring his deportation. Attorney General Aminul Huq, appearing on behalf of the state, sought adjournment of the order till next Sunday

Seoul seeks Dhaka's help to evacuate citizens from Libya By Asiuzzaman

Seoul is seeking Dhaka's help to evacuate its more than 5,000 nationals from Libya following United Nations sanctions on the country, official sources said Thursday. "South Korean embassy offi-

cials had talks with Civil Aviation and Biman authorities seeking help to evacuate Korean nationals from Libya if the situation aggravates," a Civil Aviation authorities source said. Meanwhile, the national air-

line, Biman, has suspended its once-a-week flight to Tripoli after the sanctions, including a ban on flights in and out of that country, went into force on Wednesday. British insurance company

Llyods withdrew its insurance cover from Bangladesh Biman following the sanction imposed because Libya failed to hand over two intelligence agents suspected of blowing up of a Pan Am airliner over the Scottish town of Lockarbie in

South Korea has no flights to Tunisia or any other neighbouring country of Libya. A Biman official says that if
