## Sanctions to remain until Libya complies with UN demands: US official

sank into isolation on Wednesday as the world community, including its Arab neighbours, applied United Nations sanctions against it, reports AFP.

Many countries, including France and the United States, said they were cutting Libya's diplomatic presence on their territories, while several Libyan planes tried in vain to break an embargo on air links with the country.

Meanwhile a top US official in Washington stressed that the sanctions will remain in effect until we are satisfied that Libya had complied with UN demands concerning airline terrorism.

In particular it stated that Yeltsin must draft plans for restructuring of the government in line with the decisions of the fifth and sixth congress.

The fifth congress, held last November, gave Yeltsin special powers to run the economy until December 1. Saturday's resolution appeared to be aimed at ending those powers in three months. Nonetheless, the vote indicated that many hardliners in the parliament had been won over to the argument, put forward by Yeltsin's supporters, that there were no realistic alternatives to the current course of re-

It also appeared to support the current administrations conviction that Russia, at least for now and the next few years, needed a strong prestdential style government in stead of a parliamentary republican system.

Earlier Wednesday, deputies approved plans to integrate the new Russian federation treaty signed last month into the country's new constitution, but failed to debate any new draft constitu tions due to disagreements be tween conservatives and re formers.

Gleb Yakunin, a leading member of the pro-government democratic Russia movement, said conservatives, who dominate the parliament believed that a new draft constitution prepared by the parliament's constitutional committee was too radical.

The 57-page draft emphasises human rights and democracy in governmental structures but was described recently by St Petersburg Mayor Anatoly Sobchak as in comprehensible. Sobchak has drafted an alternative.

The congress was due to continue debate on the consti tution and, notably, the states of Crimea, on Thursday and some sources have predicted the current session could run into next week.

#### FIS leader imprisoned for 10 years

ALGIER, Apr 16 : Algeria's military court sentenced a leader of the Islamic Salvation Front (FIS) to 10 years in prison on Wednesday, stripping him of political rights in a signal of continued crackdown on fundamentalism, reports

Reuter. Less than four months ago, Mohammed Said's party was set to take power in parliament after a first-round victory in a general election, bringing hope to Muslim fundamentalists in neighbouring North African countries and the

#### sentenced in his absence. US warns to exple Serbia from CSCE

WASHINGTON, Apr 16: The United States warned yesterday that it would ask for the expulsion of Serbia's delegation from the CSCE if it did not halt its offensive against Bosnia-Herzegovina by April 29, reports AFP.

The state department said it would call for an emergency meeting of the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE) to discuss expelling the Serbian Delegation if the situation had not im-

proved by April 29. "Our message to Serbian civilian and military authorities is that if they continue their aggression against Bosnia, and to deny human rights to Serbia's own citizens, Serbia will very quickly become an international pariah," said State Department Spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler.

# Y'slav army deployed in Bosnia

SARAJEVO, Apr 16: A unit of the Serbian-led Yugoslav Federal Army was deployed in part of the Bosnia-Herzegovina capital yesterday, as Washington issued a stern warning against Serbian aggression in the former Yogoslav republic, reports AFP.

The Federal Army troops, which the Muslim and Croatian populations say are siding with ethnic Serbians in the conflict now engulfing the republic. were sent to two Sarajevo neighbourhoods were fighting was underway between Serbian

separatists and local police. In Washington, the US State Department, warned that Serbia was set to become an "international pariah" if Serbian civilian and military authorities "continue their aggression against Bosnia".

Spokesman Margaret Tutwiler said the United States would ask for Serbia to be expelled from the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE) unless it halted its offensive against Bosnia-Herzegovina.

Britain also vesterday said Serbian leader should be persuaded to adapt a "reasonable attitude" and urged all sides to step back from the fighting.

Foreign Secretary Douglas Hurd, in an interview with the BBC, said the Serbs "know they cannot exist in isolation, that they are at the heart of Europe and there is no way in which they can survive or continue to

be isolated.

Meanwhile, leaders of a self-proclaimed Serbian Republican in the Bosnia-Herzegovina late yesterday order an all-out mobilization of Serbian fighters.

Serbian defense groups on Bosnian territory now constituted the "army of the Serbian Republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina," the community

SRNA news agency reported. The Serbs led by separatists under the banner of the Serbian Democratic Party, are laying claim to some 65 per cent of Bosnian territory. The Serbian community accounts for one-third of the Bosnian population.

#### She hates Marlon Brando

PAPEETE: A French magistrate is seeking to question the American film star Marlon Brando in connection with the May 1990 murder of his daughter's boyfriend, judicial officials said Wednesday, reports AFP.

But Brando has shunned all requests to testify since a list of more than 30 questions to him was first issued by a French investigating magistrate on February 19, they said.

The film star has even refused to acknowledge the judicial order, known as an international rogatory commission.

The Papeete magistrate here wants to question Marlon Brando following statements reportedly made to investigators by Cheyenne Brando implicating her father in Drollet's mur

Cheyenne Brando told investigating magistrate Max Gatti, according to an unconfirmed report in Wednesday's editions of the French newspaper Le Figaro, that she "hated" her fa-

Cheyenne Brando, Christian Brando's 22-year-old half-sister, has been charged in this French south Pacific territory in connection with the murder but has not yet gone on trial.

#### KABUL. Apr Afghanistan's top generals appealed Thursday to the United Nations to accelerate efforts to bring a peaceful end to the country's 13-year-old civil war. Muslim rebels, however, said it

was too late for the UN plan. reports AP. Meanwhile, diplomats in Kabul and Pakistan insisted that President Najibullah had not fled the Afghan capital, as Iranian Radio had reported

earlier Thursday. The generals have pulled hundreds of reinforcements into Kabul after the rebels on

Wednesday captured the country's main military base and the Communist-style government's vital supply route to the former Soviet Union.

Rebels said they were trying to form their own 28-member commission to go to Kabul, possibly as early as this weekend, to take power from Najibullah's Soviet-installed

"It's too late for the UN Plan," said Masood Khalili, a spokesman for Jamiat-e-Islami (Party of Islam). It is one of the severn main resistance groups that spearheaded an offensive

government.

Afghan generals urge UN to gear up peace process that many now fear has killed hope for the UN peace plan.

"The UN formula is gone, the UN should now provide a new formula for the surrender of Najib to mujahedeen forces, said Khalili, speaking from the Pakistani border city of Peshawar, the headquarters of the Afghan resistance.

The UN special envoy on Afghanistan, Benon Sevan, has been trying to implement a plan to install a neutral council of 15 Afghans to replace Naifbullah. The council would govern Kabul until an interim government can be chosen at a

Najibullah has promised to surrender his executive powers to the temporary council and to step down.

Although Najibullah's move was initially praised by the guerillas, many now believe it weakened a government already river with ethnic and personal differences.

It also caused middle - and low-ranking officers in the military to cut secret deals with the guerillas and encouraged the radical rebels to make one last attempt to bring down Najibullah, the

Troops loyal to the government were placed on high alert. Two of Afghanistan's country's ton generals. Astf Dilawar and Mohammed Nabi Azimi brought 700 militia and soldiers from northern Afghanistan to prevent an expected attack on the city's southern outskirts and to protect Kabul's only airport.

They appealed to the UN to quickly form the interim council and thwart any rebel

attempts to take over the city. They also urged the UN Security Council to send peacekeeping troops to help maintain peace.

The Russian Embassy on Wednesday ordered the evacuation of half of its 40-member staff diplomats said. They cited security concerns and fears that its employees might be taken hostage in retaliation for the 1979 invasion of Afghanistan by the Soviet Red Army. The last troops of Moscow's 115,000 troops returned home in February 1989.

### Iraq withdraws troops

WASHINGTON , Apr 16 Iraq, which has been massing troops and weapons in Kurdish areas in the north, seems to be withdrawing from those areas, an administration official said yesterday, reports Reuter. "It now appears that the

Iraqi forces are in one of these periods where they're tending to withdraw from points of confrontation and avoid armed clashes with the Kurds," he The official briefed re-
