Artificial fuel crisis in N-dists prevailing

SIRAJGANJ, Apr 22: Crisis of diesel and LP gas has been prevailing in 16 northern districts of the country.

Following the closure of entrance at river Barail from Jamuna for emergence of charlands the Baghabari river port is still remains deserted.

Many oil tankers can not anchor at the oil depots of Bangladesh Petroleum Corporations (BPC) at Baghabari in Sirajganj district causing disruption in supply of diesel and LP gas in northern region.

It is gathered that portion of entrance to Barail river was dredged twice during the last two months. But the dredging gave no positive result.

The BIWTA has warned the heavy ships and tankers not to enter into the river Barail. At present, small and light tankers are anchoring at Baghabari oil depots which can not meet the minimum requirement of fuel in the northern region of the country.

It is observed that diesel and LP gas are supplied to the dealers mainly by road. Some dealers are taking delivery through river route and this fuel is being shifted to un-

No hard news from the Shahjalal University of Science and Technology yet; for, the campus is free from those gunbattles and butcherings that bring our universities into news headlines today, gruesome and depressing though.

But it has other stories to tell, different from those emanating from elsewhere. These are the tales of endeavours by its students, teachers and the vice-chancellor to make the most of whatever facilities and resources have come to them, replenishing and reinforcing those with their austerity and rigorous efforts with determination but gladly.

Here the students are content with the prime objective of their studies and face many a constraint and compulsion without any complaint and clamour. They have a little on campus residence facilities, no regular canteen and library, no common room and many such other facilities and amenities available with a university, yet the go along. The pressure of curriculum and syllabus is also very high, yet the many discomforts they undergo cannot distract them from their pursuit. They go with make-shift residence in labour sheds in the campus, they comfort themselves in the impoverished tea-stall and do their li brary work in a small room of the administrative building. They are 435 in strength today and 95 per cent of them do not have residence facilities in the campus and the rest 5 per cent have only been recently shifted to the students hall still under construction. Many still live in the sheds and the others are putting up at their friends' and fellations', some 7 km away from the university here in this town. The university has no transport for them either. They shuttle off some of their precious time.

Many of them are eminent scholars of the country who had more lucrative jobs, both at home and abroad, but they have brushed them aside to court the many shortcomings and multitude of snags that this teething university has. They are a band of pioneers dedicated to the building of their posterity. When such are the struggles


compulsions, its vice-chancellor, Prof Sadruddin Ahmed Chawdhry, a man who in his school days in British period so fondly cherished the dream of having such an institution here, now shouldering the onus of weathering his ship, has become a veritable dynamo making himself available in the classes, his office, work sites and Dhaka offices concerned with the university and the project, still finding time to meet people interested in the making of the university. He is an eminent professor of physics, and loves to teach despite other pressures. He is the vice-chancellor of a forming university and has to work hard in the office deep into night. He is the project boss now and so he goes round the work sites, sometimes suggesting some modifications here and there and solving this or that problem posed by the nature and feature of the acquired site, such as water-logging and finding and developing functional space in those 211 acres of land, 50% of which are either hillocks or marshes. Then he flies to Dhaka to move different authorities so as to stave off hurdles and bottlenecks that have been perennially pestering the institution, most frequent one being fund problem. His initia tive to mobilise other sources for building the university has been invoking positive results as well. der the country's 4th 5-year Plan due to funds problem, It is understood that the university proposed a Development Scheme for its 2nd phase involving Tk 2713.62 lacs (including a Turkish grant of Tk 422.62 lac) for constructing another academic building, women's hall (part), Kamal Ataturk Boys' hostel (with Turkish grant), library hall, 24 residential quarters for teachers and staff, VC's quarters (part) and other ancillary facilities with a view to opening seven more disciplines accommodating an estimated 1800 students and droves of more teachers, but the amount has been heavily slashed down to Tk 1942.62 lacs (including the Turkish grant). And with this amount the university has got to acquire an additional 106.64 acres of land as the earlier 211 acres have but little functional space and require heavy drainage of funds for development of sites and foundation works. The most of 1st phase allocation of Tk 1050 lacs were consumed up by the land leaving little for construc-

The construction also could not be completed on the target date of June, '90. And though its registrar, Dr Bazlul Mobin Choudhury, an eminent scholar of the country, joined his assignment as early as in Feb. '90 for opening the uni versity in the later part of '90, it could not be started before 16 Feb. 1991

This is a full-fledged university born after six decades of agitations and interminable waves of frustration of the people of this region, but happily it now incorporates those aims and objectives set forth in the constitution and curriculum prepared by a historic convention of educationists, philanthropists and other leaders held at Sylhet in 1936 for setting up such a university for Surma Valley at Sylhet. Two more conventions passed the scheme in 1945 held at this

There are no subsidiary subjects. And their result will be determined on the basis of marks obtained in all the three subjects. Besides, Bangla and English are compulsory for them and must pass in these subjects as well to get his Honours Degree. Physical exercises are there and a student must attend at least 20 classes of them in a

Teachers are no less inconvenienced. They also have no on-campus residence facilities. They have to reside in rented houses in this comparatively that is heavily weighed by honest officers before joining their assignment here. But these are the professors who have come here to co-operate with their erstwhile colleague and friend in building a university with a difference, they have come to help Dr Sadruddin Ahmed Chawdhury, the first vicechancellor of the university. They could not be provided with bearers and peons for fund problem, they did not mind carrying their own chalk, duster and register to the classes. They do not have enough helping hands in their department, they don't grudge doing that extra work. Even they did not hesitate to do this or that bit of masonry and car-

Very much like the curriculum and programme that were envisioned then, this university lays stress on science and technology, providing for research together with advancement and dissemination of knowledge, specially in emerging sciences and technology. Some selected disciplines in humanities and social sciences will also be taught in it. Initially it proposes to have seven schools, namely 1) physical sciences. 2) life sciences, 3) agriculture and mineral sciences, 4) applied sciences and technology. 5) social sciences, 6) management and business administration and finally 7) institute of modern languages. So far during the first phase, only five disciplines could be launched

These are physics, chemistry, maths, statistics and economics. After the completion of 2nd phase work, some more disciplines are envisaged .
