### Stich disappoints

his home fans MUNICH, Germany, May 2: Wimbledon champion Michael Stich disappointed his home fans when he was swept out of the Munich Open quarter-finals by Swede Magnus Larsson on Friday, reports Reuter.

The German top seed and world number five lacked his normal sharpness and accuracy and his serve-and-volley game failed to outsmart Larsson who reached the semifinals 6-4 6-4 in just 70 minutes.

The victory was a major triumph for the Swede who has slipped to 59th in the world rankings after an injury.

Today, Larsson will meet little-known German Markus Newie who came back from behind to beat Andrei Medvedev of the Ukraine 4-6, 7-6, 6-4, reaching the semifinals of an ATP event for the first time in his career.

The bespectacled Naewie, who upset Dutch fifth seed Richard Krajicke and claycourt specialist Guillermo Perez-Roldan of Argentina on his way to the last eight, clinched the most important victory of his career in two hours 23 minutes.

But the match was riddled with unforced errors and Naewie, ranked 91st in the world, will need to lift his game substantially to secure a place in Sunday's final.

Stich was the sixth of the eight seeds to fall at the Munich event. But Czechoslovak second seed Petr Korda kept alive his title hopes with a 6-3, 3-6, 6-3 quarter-final victory over Sweden's Nicalus Kulti.

But since returning to Rome in 1987, the women also have drawn large crowds, drawn by the perennial Rome favourite Sabatini, in a major tune-up for the French open, a Grand Slam event on clay.

The Argentine lost to Steffi Graf in 1987 but then won the Italian the next two years and beat Monica Seles in last year's final. Seles won in 1990,

crushing Martina Navratilova. Graf has not returned since a leading Italian newspaper criticised her as being "brutta" or ugly, and German media made it a question of national honour.

But returning is another crowd favourite, Jenniser Capriati, the American teenager who travels on the tour with her Italian father Other top entries include Mary Joe Fernandez, Conchita Martinez, Anke Hober, Katerina Maleeva and Nathalie Tauziat

No Italian women are among the contenders, but that's not expected to dampen

the enthusiasm. The men's event starting May 11 has drawn acceptances from the top 15 ranked men in the world, the strongest field in memory, although lastminute defections may thin

## Graf in Hamburg final

to reach the final of the Hamburg women's clay court tournament with a 6-3, 6-0 victory over compatriot Anke Huber on Saturday, reports

But the 22-year-old Graf showed her experience over Huber, five years her junior.

She made two key breaks when the players returned and proceeded to run away with the first set 6-3 in 35 minutes.

Huber lost her nerve and patience in the second set and Graf cruised home without dropping a game to triumph in 62 minutes.

In Sunday's final Graf will meet the winner of Saturday's second semifinal between Argentine second seed Gabriela Sabatini and Spanish third seed Arantxa Sanchez Vicario.

An earlier AP report said Three of the world's best players had swift victories Friday to advance to what promise to be top-rate semi-finals at the dlrs 350,000 ATP women's tennis tournament in Hamburg.

Top-seeded Steffi Graf of Germany, second in world rankings, overpowered unseeded Leila Meshki of Georgia 6-2, 6-2.

Graf will play sixth-seeded compatriot Anke Huber in the semifinal, who surprisingly defeated fourth-seeded Manuela Maleeva-Fragniere Switzerland 5-7,6-2, 7-5.

The 17-year-old Huber who is ranked 11th in the world. is back this week after a threemonth recess to nurse an injured ankle.

Agassi's confidence was obvious in the third set as he consistently put pressure on Eltingh's serve. The second seed picked up the break he needed in the seventh game and maintained his advantage the rest of the way.

Neither Sampras nor Connors is at his best on clay, but the slow surface worked as something of an equaliser for Connors against the serve and volleyer in the first set.

Eventually, however, the top seed's big serve made the difference as he delivered 16

## Indians lead in Davis Cup tie

JAKARTA, May 2: Indian players Friday defeated their Indonesian opponents two-nil on the first day of the Asta-Oceania second qualifying round for the Davis Cup here, reports AFP.

India's Leander Paes beat Benny Wijaya in straight sets 7-5, 6-2, 6-4, while Ramesh Krishnan of India had an equally emphatic victory against Indonesia's Dede Suhendar, winning 6-2, 6-0, 6-

Wijaya, ranked 338th by the International Tennis Federation, led the game until 5-3 in the first set. However. Paes, ranked 245th, rallied and took the set 7-5.

. In the second set, Paes picked up his tempo and gave Wijaya no chance to score more than the two games.

Wijaya, 18, fought back in the third set, the pair reaching four games all, but Paes, one year his senior, asserted himself, putting the outcome beyond doubt and giving India a one-nil lead in the tie.

The pair had met three times in the past, with Wijaya losing once.

In the second match. India's current best player Ramesh Krishnan had no difficulties dominating the game against Suhendar. Krishnan is ranked 180th

in the ITF list while Suhandar is 534th. The match will resume to-

day with a doubles Krishnan and Pacs against Suharyadi and Bonit Wiryawan.

### HK lead over Thailand

HONG KONG, May 2: Hong Kong wrapped up the Group Two Asia-Oceania Davis Cup tennis competition Saturday with a come-from-behind doubles victory over Thailand, reports AP.
