Masood wants 'a progressive modern' Afghanistan

NEW DELHI, May 3: Commander Ahmed Shah Masood, Defence Minister in the Afghan Mujahideen council, has said that he would like Afghanistan to be a progressive modern state, reports PTI.

"My model for my state is not Iran," commander Masood said in an interview published by the Karachi- based English daily "Dawn."

He said "we are not fundamentalist but we want to run it as an Islamic state where Shariah is the law."

Masood said these would have to be viewed in the context of New Delhi's continued and strong support for the previous

government. He was angry about Pakist

an's encouragement to the Afghan fundamentalist leader. Gulbuddin Hekmatyar.

But for Pakistan's support, there would be no threat from Gulbuddin Hekmatyar, the Dawn quoted him as saying.

The interview was conducted at Charikar, about 60 km north of Kabul, just before he left for the Afghan capital last week.

The sources told reporters that former Chief Justice Karim Shardan was taken from his home by three armed men on Saturday evening. His body, showing signs of torture, was found the next morning.

Former Civil Aviation Minister Wadir Safi was also abducted on Saturday evening and is still missing, the sources said.

Speaking in Shardan's home where women could be heard wailing, the sources said that two nights ago unidentified men tried to kidnap Abdul Quddus Ghorbandi, a leading members of the formerly communist Watan party.

LA police urge troops to stay 4 more days

LOS ANGELES, May 3: Los Angeles police chief Daryl Gates on Sunday called for fed eral troops to stay in the streets for up to four more days as weary residents of America's second largest city began cleaning up from three days of the worst rioting in US history, reports AP.

The large presence of police and military will continue until peace has been restored Gates said on the weekly CBS network programme, Face the Nation.

"I would hope that we can go through the next three or four days with these troops here on the streets in a peaceful mode," he said.

The dusk-to-dawn curfew will remain in effect until "we have two or three days of total peace," he said, adding that the city has been peaceful for the last two days.

Soldiers continued to patrol the city and guard fire-gutted and ransacked stores a day after President Bush formally declared America's second largest city and its environs a disaster area.

At least 44 people were killed, including three people added to the toll by the coroner's office Sunday. An additional 2,116 were injured in the riots triggered by

Wednesday's acquittal of four white policemen charged with assault in the beating of black motorist Rodney King.

The death toll surpassed the 43 that occurred during the 1967 Detroit riots, which had been the bloodiest US urban uprising. Damage estimates totalled dirs 550 mil

injury to any Bangladeshis, he replied in the negative. "We are in touch with our mission there and there is nothing to worry about

KUALA LUMPUR, May 3: Despite pressure from Western environmentalists, Malaysia's biggest state Sarawak will stick to sustainable logging in its tropical rainforests.

However, the logging would be done on selective basis and it would be gradually reduced by 1995.

The logging policy of Sarawak was explained State's Chief Minister Tan Sri Abdul Taib Mahmud on Thursday. He was talking to a group of journalists from Asiapacific countries including Bangladesh in Sarawak's capi-

tal Kuching. The Chief Minister countered Western environmentalists' anti-logging campaign against Malaysia and said that his country is committed to sustainable management of its forests and is taking steps to conserve as much of its forests as possible.

Sarawak produces most of the Malaysia's tropical timber which is about 19 million cubic metres annually. Sarawak earns about 1360 million US dollars a year by exporting the timber.

For quite sometime, Malaysia has been facing severe criticism for its logging in Sarawak from some Western Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs). The NGOs termed the log-
